

Students entering universitylevel institutes from high school with gold or silver medals are exempt from examinations and automatically draw the stipend. For the first term it is 220 rubles. Requalification after the first examinations raises the "regular stipend," as it is called, to between 320 and 350 rubles

For exchange purposes the Soviet government values the ruble at 25 cents. Its purchasing value is from five to eight cents Additionally, outstanding students may be awarded a "personal stipend" for application 500 rubles monthly.
