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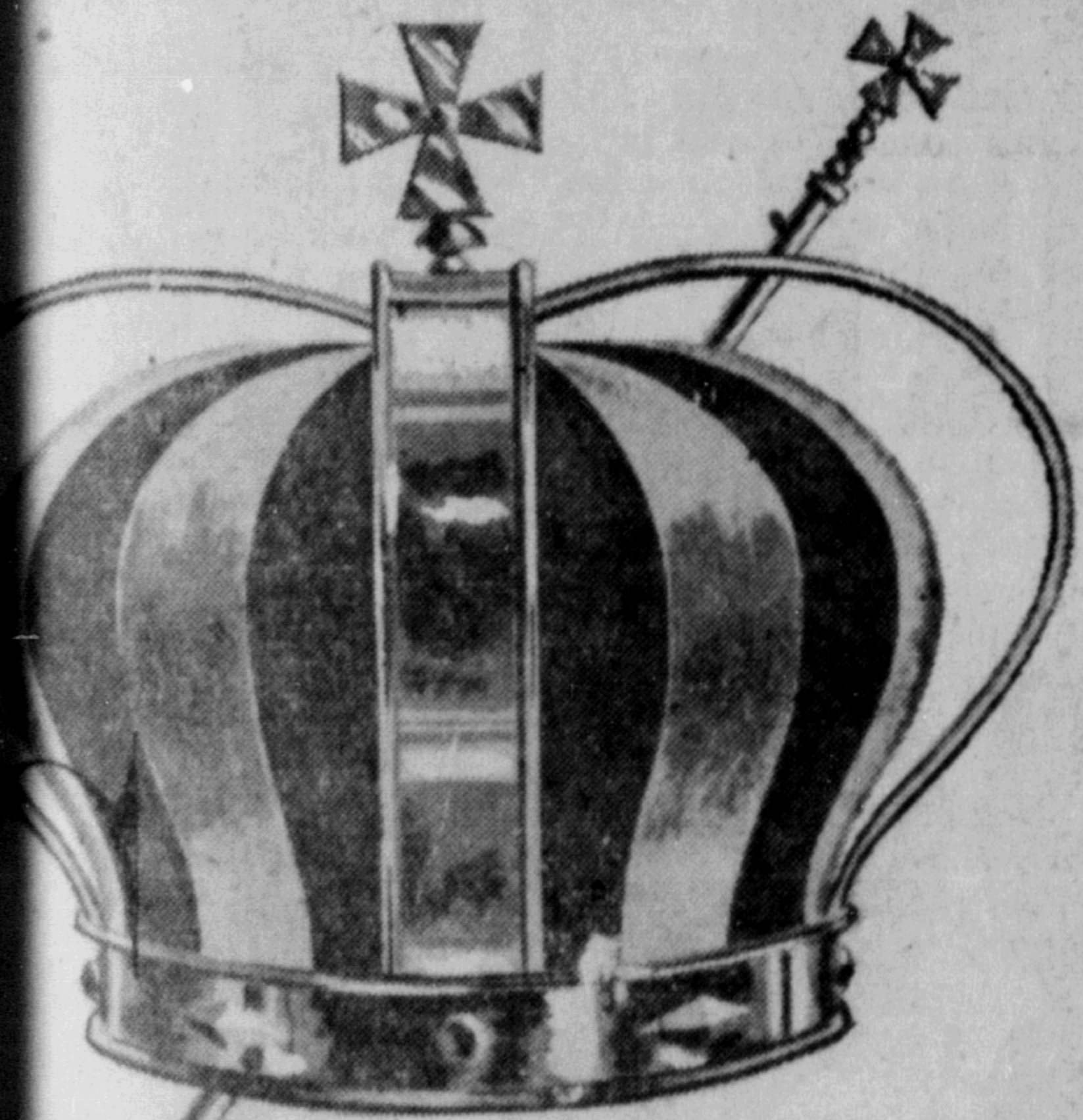
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## Candidates Awaiting Canadian Voters' Verdict

The election campaign died  
away to a murmur today. Most  
of the candidates sat back fret-  
fully to await the people's ver-  
dict Monday.

Prime Minister St. Laurent  
held his last major rally last  
night at Toronto. He goes home  
to Quebec City today and will  
speak Sunday there and at Baie  
St. Paul.

George Drew, Progressive Con-  
servative leader, visits three  
Lake Ontario centres today—  
Oshawa, Cobourg and Kings-  
ton—to close out his campaign.

CCF leader M. J. Coldwell re-  
mained in Saskatchewan. He  
spoke Friday at Prince Albert  
and later to his own riding of  
Rosetown-Biggar.

Solon Low, Social Credit lead-  
er, was in his home constitu-  
ency of Peace River after a brief  
dash into British Columbia.

### NO MORE BROADCASTS

All political radio broadcasts  
came to a halt Friday night.  
The Liberals were the last to be  
heard on the national networks.

Mr. St. Laurent made the ra-  
dio broadcast and charged that  
Progressive Conservative cam-  
paign promises were a "bare-  
faced attempt to fool the peo-  
ple."

A vote for a Progressive Con-  
servative candidate "is a vote  
to take risks with the security  
of Canada and the Canadian  
people." He didn't mean that  
Mr. Drew intended to risk Can-  
ada's national security "but that  
could not help but be the con-  
sequence of carrying out his  
promise."

"None of us likes to have to  
spend money on defence, but

we in the government believe  
the majority of Canadians  
would rather spend \$2,000,000,  
000 a year to prevent a war  
than \$5,000,000,000 or \$6,000,000,  
000 a year to fight one with all  
the unimaginable horrors which  
the newest weapons could in-  
flict on mankind," Mr. St. Laur-  
ent said.

At Ottawa, Mr. Drew denied  
that his party's pledge to re-  
duce defence spending would  
weaken Canada's armed forces:  
"We will provide all the mil-  
lions needed for real defence  
but not one red cent for waste,  
extravagance and inefficiency."

### TO END OVER-TAXATION

He said his party had ex-  
plained how taxes could be re-  
duced by at least \$500,000,000 a  
year by ending "over-taxation"  
and increasing efficiency in the  
defence department.

Mr. Drew promised a five-day  
week and freedom from "politi-  
cal interference" for the civil  
service. He criticized State Sec-  
retary Pickersgill, recently ap-  
pointed to the cabinet from his  
job as clerk of the Privy Coun-  
cil, a civil service post, for his  
"full time" political activities  
while he was clerk.

Mr. Coldwell denied that the  
CCF supports John Diefenbaker,  
Progressive Conservative candi-  
date in Prince Albert. He urged  
his theatre audience of 200 to  
support Dave Corney, CCF candi-  
date in Prince Albert.

At Prince George, B.C., Mr.  
Low criticized Mr. Coldwell who,  
he claimed, had said Social  
Credit was "North American  
fascism."

"Mr. Coldwell is a bitterly  
disappointed man with a vin-  
dictive and abusive tongue," he  
said.

tor among the world powers, she  
suggested, saying that the Liberal  
government had weakened Com-  
monwealth ties to the extent the  
United Kingdom had been forced  
to trade with Socialist countries  
and with Norway and Sweden.

Along international lines Mrs.  
Minard asserted that Canada  
was merely a source of natural  
resources for the United States,  
that Canada was not being  
"sold out" to the U.S. "but ship-  
ped out." The United States, she  
said, was even usurping Cana-  
dian rights in the Arctic by lay-  
ing claim to the untold mineral  
wealth of the far north.

Kitimat and Ungava were two  
examples of Canadian raw ma-  
terials would be or were being  
shipped out of the country with  
Canadians being forced to buy  
back the finished product from  
the U.S.

Mrs. Minard said that the LPP  
had fought the Japanese Fish  
treaty and that now two years  
too late the Liberal government  
was coming to realize the extent  
to which the Japanese fishing  
fleets were depleting the Cana-  
dian catch. She asserted that an  
embargo on fish filets to the  
United States was slated, some-  
thing on which the Prince Rup-  
ert canneries depended.

Summing up the party plat-  
form, Mrs. Minard said:

"The LPP seeks a new national  
policy, to process our own ma-  
terials at home for security and  
peace, build the all-Canadian St.  
Lawrence seaway despite rail-  
way and transportation lobbies  
from the United States, break  
the stranglehold of U.S. mono-  
poly on Canadian economy, and  
return to the principles of the  
United Nations charter."

She quoted Sir Winston  
Churchill as saying "that the  
United Nations was a union of all  
nations of the world, not an anti-  
communist organization."
