Organist was Mr. Henry Pluym, and during the signing of the register the choir sang "O Perfect Love."

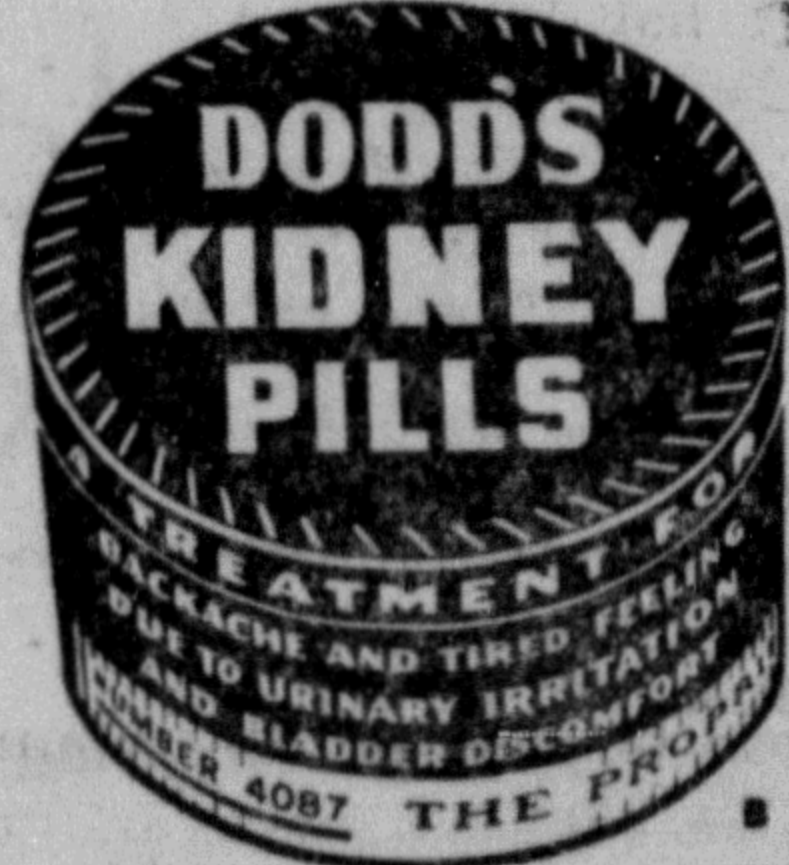
