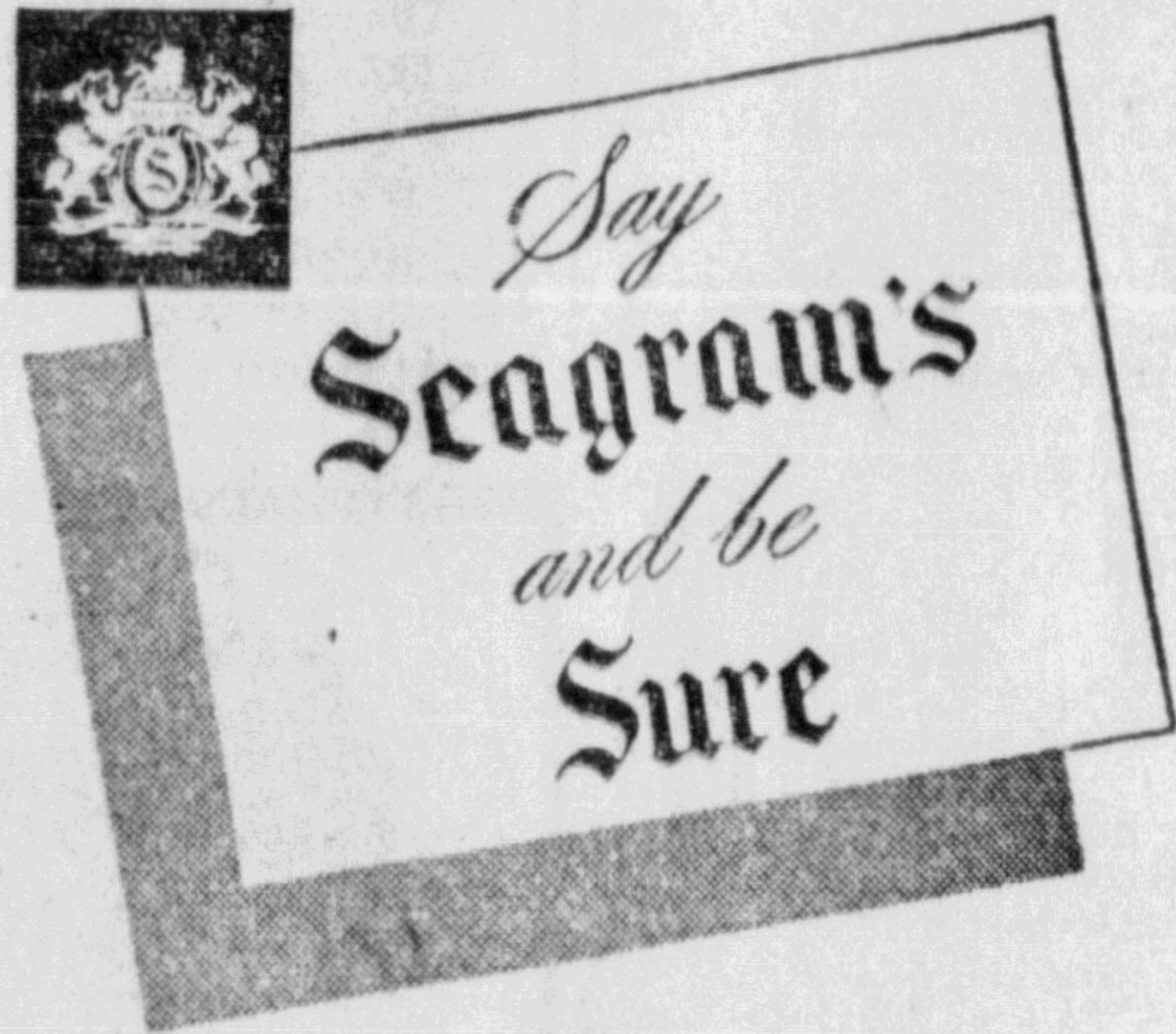


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New Type of Middle East Defence Organization 'Favored' by U.S.

KARACHI (Reuters) — U.S. diplomatic circles here say the current Middle East and Asian tour by State Secretary Dulles is to sow the seeds for a new type of Middle East defence organization.

They say Dulles favors an organization springing directly out of the Middle East nations themselves, free from domination by other countries, including Britain and the United States, associated with the Middle East defence organization proposal of October, 1951.

Dulles is understood to feel that the earlier proposal was somewhat artificial, and that a new type of organization, formed by the countries of this area, would have better prospects of support from nations that had little enthusiasm for the previous project.

Pakistan Foreign Minister Mohammed Zafrullah Khan is understood to have held this

view since the inception of the MEDO plan, and observers believe this subject was one of the main topics discussed by the two statesmen at their meeting last Saturday.

The observers say Dulles has been encouraged by what he has seen and heard on his tour, and by the apparent realization by the Middle Eastern countries that they cannot stand off any outside threat on the strength of their own power alone.

Diplomats believe that Dulles gives top priority to the settlement of the Suez Canal zone dispute between Britain and Egypt. He is said to feel that a satisfactory solution there will go a long way toward promoting the defence project and dispelling some of the Middle East's suspicions of western aims.

In his two long talks with Pakistan Premier Mohammed Ali Saturday Dulles is also understood to have laid great emphasis on settlement of the Kashmir dispute with India—a subject which he also discussed in New Delhi with Prime Minister Nehru.

Reports here indicate that many misunderstandings between the U.S. and India were straightened out by the secretary of state's talks in New Delhi.

Poland Holds MIG At Least Another Week

COPENHAGEN (Reuters) — The Soviet-type MIG-15 jet fighter which crash-landed on Bornholm Island a week ago will not be handed over to Poland before the end of next week, officials said today.

Police interrogation of the Polish pilot, Zdzislaw Jazwenski, 21, is not expected to be completed before the middle of the week. A report will then be made to the ministry of justice for decision whether his request for political asylum will be granted.

The MIG was transported overland to Vaerlose airfield, 20 miles from here, under an elaborate security guard.

The plane, second of its type to be flown to Bornholm by a Polish airman, arrived here from the island Friday night on the Danish naval inspection vessel Faros. A destroyer escorted her.

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OWN YOUR OWN HOME
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Icebreaker Sails Friday For England

MONTREAL (CP)—The sleek, new transport department icebreaker d'Iberville will soon have its first rough-water test—an Atlantic crossing. She will sail Friday for Britain to take part in the Coronation naval review.

The 5,677-ton ship is said to be the biggest, most powerful icebreaker on this continent and in the British Commonwealth.

One of the features of the ship, built last year at Lauzon, Que., are two bell-type, two-seater helicopters that serve as part of her equipment.

The flight deck is aft, where both helicopters are tied down when not in operation.

The d'Iberville with all modern facilities—a fully equipped hospital and spacious living quarters, among other features—did better than 16 knots during trials and has a range of 12,000 miles without refuelling.

She can carry a crew of 72 and as many as 50 passengers.

Her master is Capt. Charles A. Caron of l'Islet, Quebec. The d'Iberville was commissioned last week.

An Atlantic crossing in an icebreaker will mark a new experience for the 50-year-old skipper, who joined the transport department in 1932.

He said he feels his vessel can hold her own in rough waters and that the voyage will give him experience in operating and studying the d'Iberville's behavior.

The vessel is expected to reach London June 8 and then proceed to Spithead, where she will represent Canada's civil marine at naval exercises June 15.

Union Charges CMS Directors With Stalling

PRINCETON, B.C. (CP)—Officials of the Mine, Mill and Smelter Workers Union (Ind.) have charged that negotiations for a 1953 contract have been stalled by the action of the board of directors of Consolidated Mining & Smelting Company at Montreal.

Following a meeting here, officials said the board had rejected an agreement arrived at between the Cominco management and the union's negotiating committee.

The negotiations are between the company and locals of the union at Trail, Kimberley and Calgary.

A union spokesman said a settlement had been arrived at May 15 which provided for an improvement in the pension plan which would benefit older workers in their last 10 years of employment.

The union and management bargaining committees had jointly agreed to this term as recommended by a provincial government conciliation officer, the spokesman said.

Harvey Murphy, chairman of the union bargaining committee, announced following the meeting that an emergency meeting of the joint bargaining committee would be called to decide on further action.

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B.C. Legion Adopts New Name

NANAIMO (CP)—British Columbia's branch of the Canadian Legion has a new name.

Delegates to the 21st annual convention Monday adopted: "The British Columbia and Northwest States Command of the Canadian Legion" as the title.

A large delegation from Washington is attending the convention.

The meeting passed a resolution protesting that the federal government did not set up a committee in 1953 to advise the government on the War Veterans' Allowance Act. The resolution accused the government of "studied inaction."

A resolution from Creston, B.C., that Legion membership be opened to merchant marine, sailors, war correspondents, fire-fighter unit members and others was defeated by the more than 300 delegates present.

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Aids Newcomers

WINNIPEG (CP)—An organization to help newcomers here was formed here by D. St. John Magnus, who arrived from England last July with his wife and two children. Magnus said the aim is not to replace existing societies but to see that the newcomer gets help during his first few weeks.

Pensioned Steed

REGINA (CP)—Now 22 years old, "Tony the Showman," bakery horse which has hauled bread wagons for 18 years, has been pensioned off. Tony got his nickname from the bakery manager who said whenever there was a crowd or a parade, Tony would prance in real circus style.
