Vancouver Firm Granted Skeena Bridge Contract

WINNIPEG—Contract for construction of bridge superstructure over the Skeena River at Terrace has been awarded to Dawson and Hall Limited of Vancouver, the Canadian National Railways announced Tuesday.

The seven-span bridge, 1,018 feet long, will be built on the CNR line between Terrace and Kitimat.

The contract also calls for the relocation of a part of the existing highway bridge.

C.N.R. engineers report that the footings for the bridge will be built on solid rock and that actual work by the contractor will begin this week.

They said also, that since the Skeena is a mountain river and subject to frequent and rapid changes in water levels, timing of this work requires very careful study in relation to the periods when low water might be expected.

Weather conditions in the last few weeks have eliminated a considerable amount of activity in private flying here but from all accounts the flight at the Aero Club Hall on New Year's Eve was a huge success.

TO SLIDE OR NOT TO SLIDE?

The sliding delivery used by many curlers like myself in the past twenty years has been the subject of many heated arguments. Last year the Dominion Curling Association rules committee, in bringing in its recommendations for revision of existing rules governing the game in Canada, included a provision that would have enforced the rule which demanded that any player release the handle of his stone before he crossed the tee line. A long and almost bitter discussion ensued over this rule, and as one of the originators of the slide delivery, I fought strongly against such a rule being enforced.

Yet, paradoxical as it may sound, I am strongly and emphatically opposed to any young curler using the slide delivery until he has curled for at least two years. As late as three years ago, I did not share this view, but lately, after watching hundreds of lads try to slide before they had learned how to deliver a stone properly from the hack, I am forced to this conclusion. It is almost beyond belief to witness the terrible atrocities committed on the ice which have been dubbed "sliding deliveries" by the misinformed. Riders, pushers, drifters, and swimmers have all been termed unskillfully as sliders. Nothing is further from the truth.

The true slide is a follow-through after a swing delivery. This is borne out by two interesting facts. First, my brother, Grant and I played our first two years wearing rubbers and swinging from the hack without a slide. This was not premeditated, because the long slide was unknown in those days. We tried sliding after we had learned the proper mechanics of delivery. Secondly, and to my mind a much more convincing argument, Ken Moir, coach of the Gary Thode rink of Saskatoon, whose boys achieved the miracle of winning two Canadian school championships successively under his expert tutelage, would not allow his proteges to slide until the end of their second year of curling. Now they slide as far as anyone and their accuracy would make any good curler envious. Think that over, boys, before you slide yourself out of the curling rink.

BLACKWOOD on Bridge

There are two basic situations where your best bet is to pass. The first is a well-known and disgusting situation which seems to occur on about 90 per cent of the hands dealt. I refer to the case where it is clear that the opponents have most of the high cards. This situation is at times aggravated by the fact your partner has passed and you are vulnerable, while the opponents are not.

The other passing situation is a little more pleasant to contemplate. Here we learn the field of enforced caution and enter the field of strategy, misdirection, ambush and, of course, humanities.

Take today's hand for example. Mr. Dale was loaded. He had plenty in high cards for a one no trump opening. After Miss Brash opened the bidding on his right, he had plenty for a takeout double. But he passed. And that was his best action.

In fact, the situation was just about perfect for a trap. First, the opponents were vulnerable and Mr. Dale was not. Next, the opener was a known overbidder who might easily get too high if not warned of danger. Then there was the fact Mr. Dale's strongest holding was in the principal suit of the opener.

There was some risk, of course, that Miss Brash and her partner would drop the bidding before they got into trouble, and in a spot where they would not be playing doubled (as for example, if Mr. Abel had passed out Miss Brash's three diamond bid). But that chance was more than offset by the fact Mr. Dale's side could not make anything of importance even if he did come into the bidding.

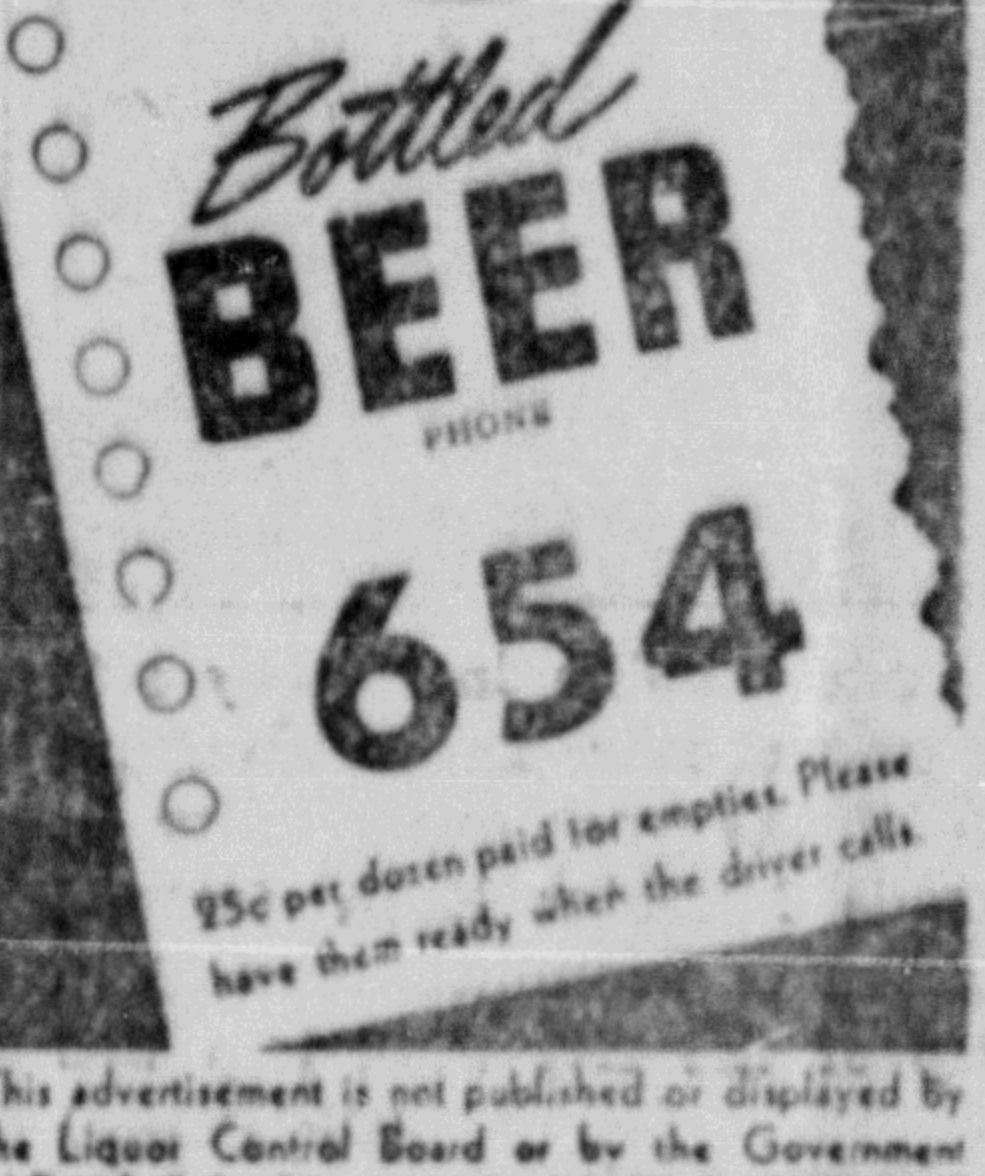
So Mr. Dale passed until his opponents reached game and then started doubling. Miss Brash played the hand as well as she could and still went down 500 points. The moral, then, is

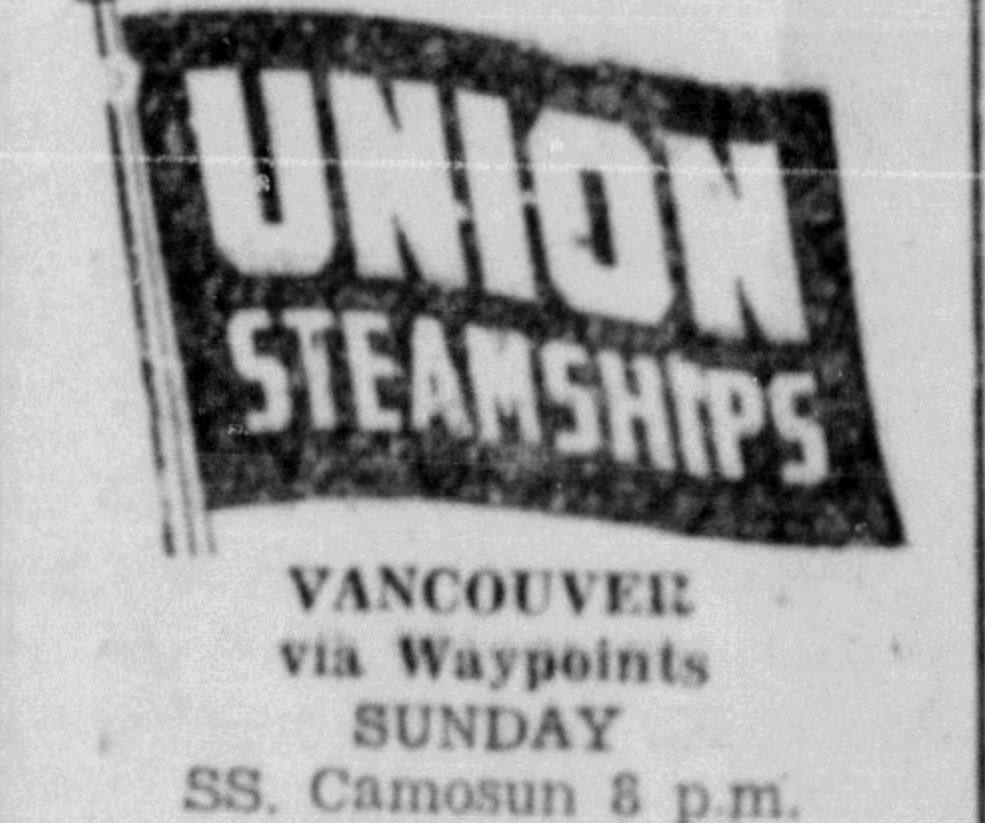

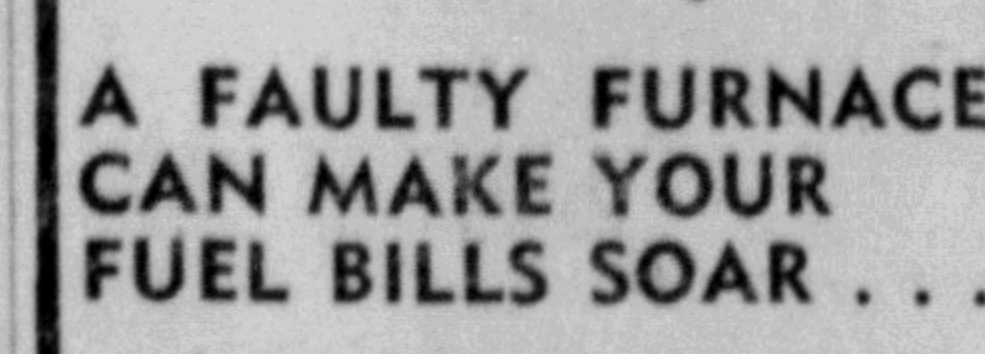

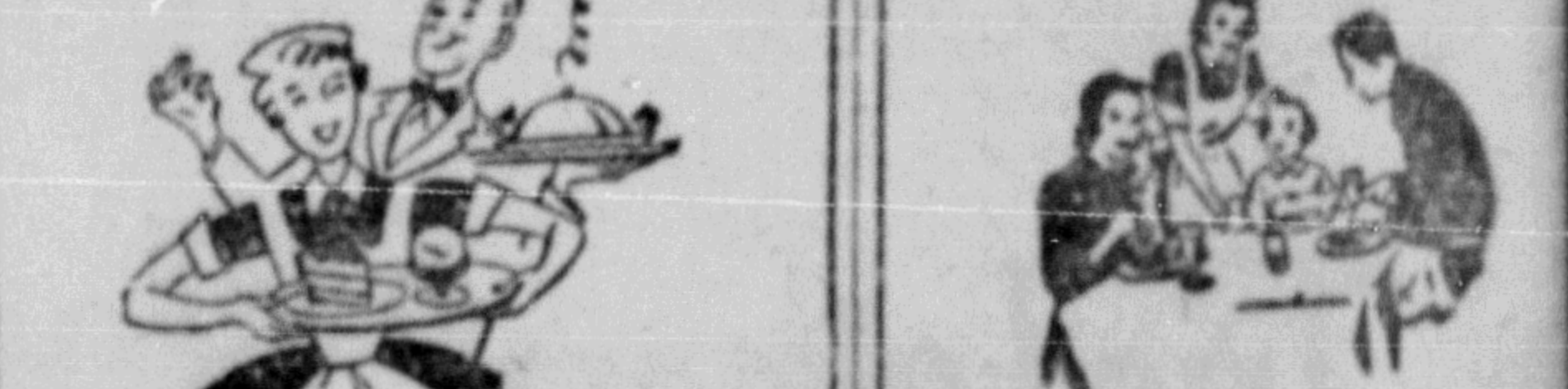
