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A Priceless Formula

\V/ITH Prince Rupert's Red Cross campaign W only five days away, it is not too early to start thinking of the magnificent work of this organization. Indeed, it is never too early.

Of all the endeavors by man to reach across international boundaries and racial and religious differences, none has ever been more successful than the Red Cross. The formula behind its success is the simple but priceless one of practising human kindness.

Wherever there is habitation, there is need. It seems to be part of the price of our growth that we should be assaulted without cease by sickness, war, hunger, catastrophes of nature such as floods and earthquakes, and other disasters which leave physical and spiritual wounds that somehow must he healed.

This is the imposing responsibility which the Red Cross has assumed. While its duties are worldwide, perhaps we can get a better understanding of its achievements by bringing the subject close to

In British Columbia the Red Cross is 53 years old. It was started in Victoria when a branch was organized there to send supplies to Canadian troops fighting in the South African war.

Here are some of the things it has done for B.C.; supplied 96 hospitals with 215,000 pints of blood; trained more than 17,000 women in home nursing; founded two lodges for soldiers; trained almost 800 instructors in swimming and water safety; put 10 outpost hospitals into operation; last year supplied clothing and other necessary supplies to 78 families burned out of their homes.

This list, which does not even include the great services rendered during the two world wars, and currently during the Korean conflict, could go on and on, but that much suffices to impart the realization that the Red Cross is performing humanitarian work in the province which we could not do without.

An adjunct of the organization which merits grateful recognition is the Junior Red Cross. Operating in schools through the co-operation of the Department of Education, the junior group has a total membership in B.C. of 118,000 in more than 4,000 classrooms.

The Juniors work for underprivileged children around the world, making health kits and toys. Another phase of Junior Red Cross is assistance given crippled and handicapped children. Since the inception of this work, more than 1,400 cases have been treated.

Objective of the campaign in Prince Rupert on March 19 is \$5,500. It's a small price to pay for the most generous of all human gifts-kindness.



We Place Our Case Before The Bar of Public Opinion

(Final Article No. 2)

We, the employees of the Provincial Government, have recently charged the Government with "stalling" on ou request for the right to Arbitration of our working conditions. Our Association has stated that in so stalling, the Government is denying its own employees not merely condition of employment but a legal and civil right guar anteed by law to all other employee groups throughout the Province. What are the facts behind these charges? Are they true, half-true, or false?

FACT NO. 1: Government Employees have, for some years, requested the right of Arbitration. On December 1 1952, the B. C. Government Employees Association presented a formal request to the present Government for this right. At subsequent meetings the Government stated that it required a further six months delay, but gave no reason for the delay. We rejected this on the grounds that such a delay amounted to a rejection of the principle of Arbitration. Our Association subsequently stated that we were prepared, at any time, to sit down with the Government and work out the details involved in granting the right to Arbitration, but that the Government should not require a further six months to study the principle involved, which is now a civil right. We feel that the Government's move to postpone decision on our request simply means, in parlia mentary parlance, that our proposal will be killed.

FACT NO. 2: In 1947 the Government of that day passed the Industrial Conciliation and Arbitration Act in an effort to promote industrial peace. The Act provided for a regulated bargaining procedure with provision for conciliation and arbitration, but its provisions were never extended to Government Employees, who continued to be treated as second-class citizens. On April, 1951, the Government established a Legislative Committee (known as the Ash Committee) to inquire into the provisions of the Act with a view to their improvement. In February, 1952, this Committee released its findings," and all members of the Committee unanimously recommended extension of the right to Arbitration for Government Employees. The Government has never implemented the findings of this Committee.

FACT NO. 3: Last spring, just prior to the Provincial election, the B.C. Government Employees Association contacted 185 candidates throughout the province to ascertain their views on the right of Government employees to arbitration. 131 took a definite stand in fayour. 29 out of 42 of the present Government's candidates were in favour. 11 of those who were ultimately elected expressed their agreement with the principle. 6 of those who became Cabinet Ministers (a majority of the Cabinet) were definitely in favour.

The B. C. Government Employees' Association feels that by their continued refusal to act on previous commitments and previous recommendations, the Government has forced us to appeal to a higher court—the court of public opinion. We therefore urge you-the people-to write or wire your M.L.A. today asking him to support, on the floor of the Legislature, the right of Government employees to Arbitration-a right now commonly enjoyed by all other groups of employees throughout the Province.


