V/ITHIN the first half of 1954 all of us who VV live in this part of the country will have more substantial evidence of the extraordinary manner in which it is developing.

A short distance to the southeast of us the great Alcan project will go into operation. The city of Kitimat will then have a settled population and soon no doubt there will be steady commuting along the arms of the triangle formed by Prince Rupert, Terrace and our new neighbor. Thus the picture takes on size, and little by little we lose the sense of being lonely waifs of the north.

North of us at about the same time work will be started on another giant enterprise. This will be the power, smelter and mining development planned on the upper Yukon by Ventures Ltd. This project is mapped as the biggest single power development in the history of Canada, with ultimate costs running to about one billion dollars.

Although the power will be created by waters in the distant Atlin area, the metallurgical centre for processing ores is expected to be at a point which, if not exactly next door to us, will be in the environs of the northwest coastal community. Predictions are that it will be at the mouth of the Taku River, not far from Tulsequah where the Consolidated Mining and Smelting Company now has its operations.

With these two brand new communities pushing up on either side, the position of Prince Rupert as the main northern port is greatly enhanced. The concentration of shipping activity is certain to shift more in this direction and the economy of Prince Rupert will become still further diversified.

Those who fear that Prince Rupert will dwindle in importance because of neighboring competition should relax. It is becoming more and more a city of multiple interests, and in that fact lies strength and growth.

Official America often speaks with two or three voices. But the one voice that Canadians (I believe) like to hear is that of President Eisenhower speaking as he did last Saturday before our own House of Commons.

With one long puff of good sense, the leader of the greatest nation on earth blew away half the cobwebs of misunderstanding spun by his insect countrymen during the postwar years.

Here was a Liberal statesman humbly addressing the parliament of a brother nation on behalf of mutual help. 'enlightened self-interest' free trade, strength and peace.

Other people certainly helped the president write the speech. Some of it was oratory. statement of faith—a line on the map of the world representing the course that President Eisenhower would like his nation to follow.

The president wants to see trade barriers let down-but at once. He wants the U.S.A. to join Canada in completing the St. Lawrence seaway-and he thinks the U.S.A. will do so. He hopes Canada and the U.S.A. will make themselves strong against attack, but never cease trying for agreement with hostile Russia.

"Our country claims no monopoly of wisdom," he said, and "there are no insoluble problems; differences can be re-


