In Flanders Fields

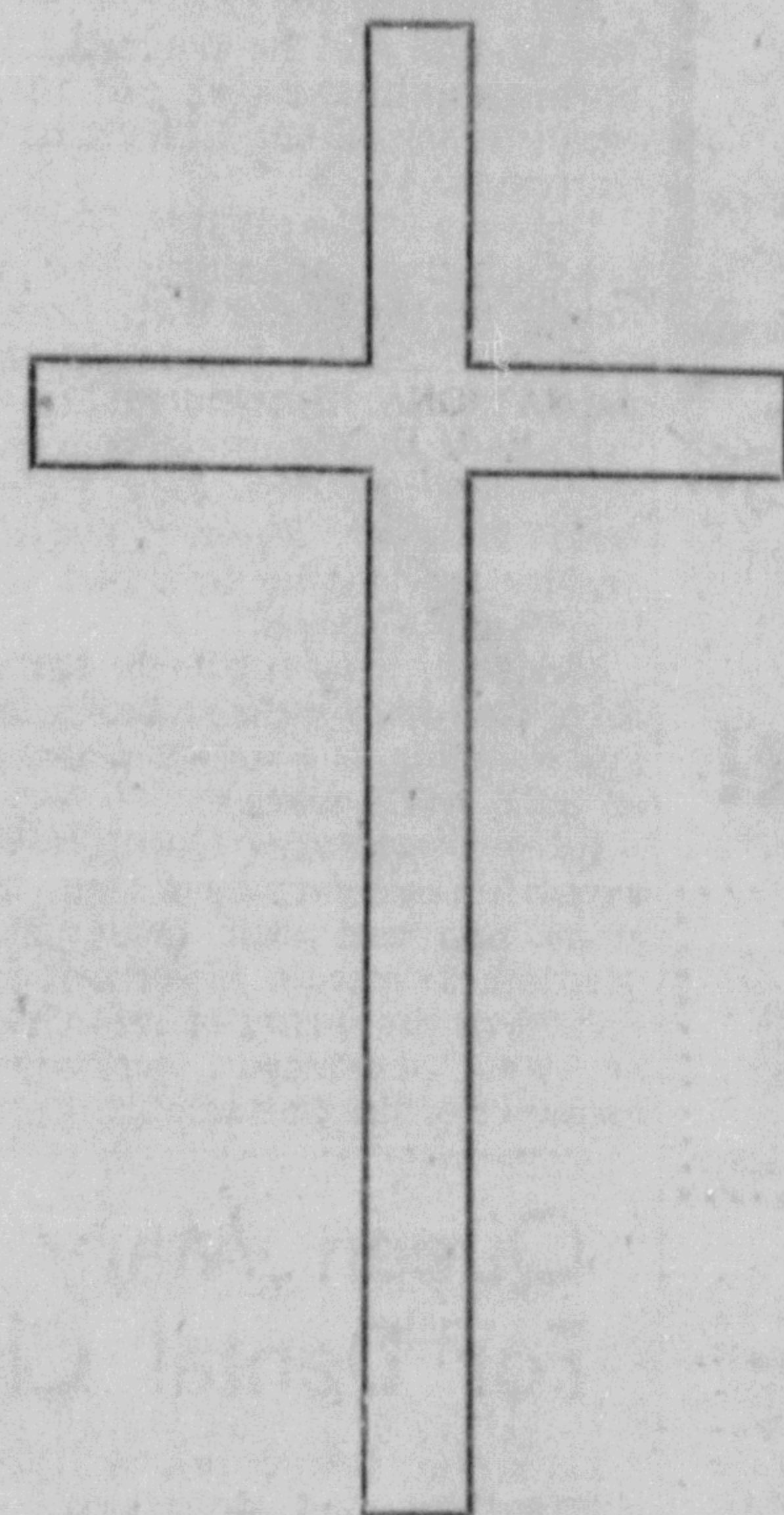
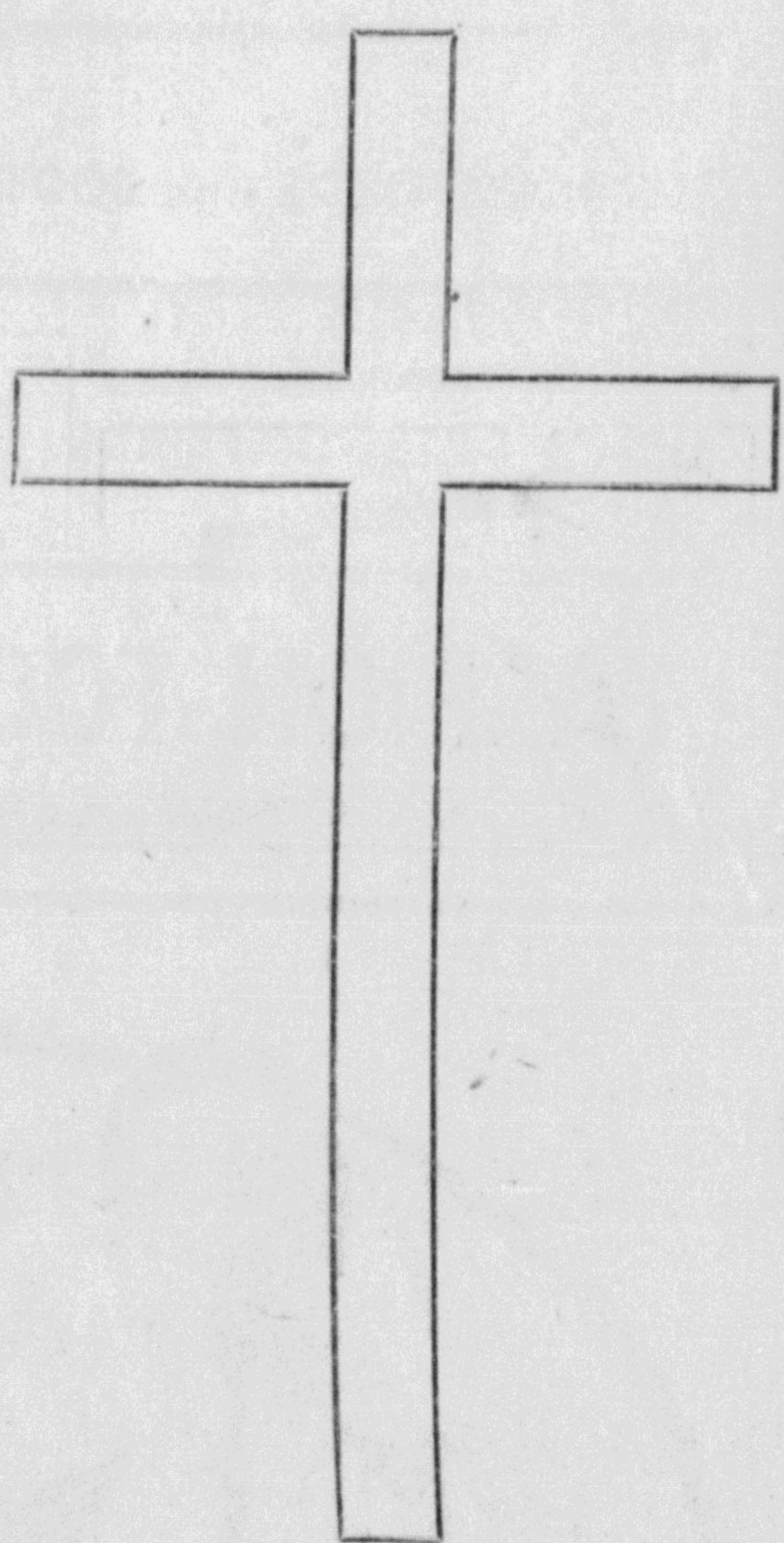
Lieut. Col. John McRae
