#### EASY APPETIZER SALAD

Hard-cooked eggs, quartered  
Thin slices unpeeled scored cucumber  
Leaf Lettuce  
Mayonnaise  
Paprika

Each serving arrange two hard-cooked egg sections and two cucumber slices on a bed of lettuce. Place a mound of mayonnaise in center and garnish it with paprika. Serve as an appetizer.

#### Committed For Trial

Ronald Riley Sent Up On False Pretences Charge In Logging Case

Ronald Edward Riley, 35-year-old, logger of Armstrong, was committed in police court Monday for trial in higher court following preliminary hearing by Magistrate W. D. Vance of a false pretences and fraud charge.

Crown alleges Riley obtained a check for \$860.64 on October 29 from H. F. Glassey who was acting as agent for Oscar Dunlap, north coast logging camp operator.

In evidence, Glassey said he gave Riley the money because accused told him he had \$3000 worth of logs boomed as part of his contract with Dunlap.

Dunlap, who operates a small logging camp at Crow Lake, near Khatzmateen, said Riley had not boomed any logs as part of the contract.

Agreement, according to testimony, was that Riley would be paid \$12 a thousand at boom scale for logs he yarded out of the woods. Riley hired six men. Six weeks later he returned to Prince Rupert, claiming the money, then disappeared.

He was arrested last month at Armstrong and escorted here by RCMP for trial. Crown counsel was A. Bruce Brown; defence conducted by Douglas Hogarth.

Ball for Riley was set at \$52,000. In police court yesterday, Defence Counsel Hogarth argued the crown had not presented evidence to conclude "essential elements" of the false pretences charge.

Mr. Hogarth claimed the case should have been "prosecuted in County Court," that it was a matter of civil law. He maintained Riley had received money that was owing him for work done. Mr. Hogarth pointed to crown evidence that 100,000 feet of logs had been cold decked. This, he said, was part of the contract.

He and Mr. Brown both referred in their argument to various recorded cases in law books. Magistrate Vance would not grant an adjournment requested by Mr. Hogarth to produce another case on record.

#### Co-op Has Dividend

More than \$8,000 in the form of 4 1/2 per cent patronage funds is being returned to members of Kaien Consumer Co-op this year. Members approved the distribution following the annual general meeting at which financial reports were read.

Operating two retail stores, the Co-op's sales totalled \$223,000 in 1951. There are 650 members. Since beginning its operation, the organization had paid out more than \$32,000 to its shareholders. Secretary-Manager George Hills reported.

#### Would Speed Negotiations

The city is "anxious to start negotiations" with British Columbia Power Commission regarding future power supply here. This is the reply City Clerk R. W. Long has been instructed to write by city council.

A letter from the Commission read at council meeting last night said the Commission was "willing to meet city representatives" at Victoria.

Commission also asked if the city would want to await findings of the Public Utilities Commission hearing regarding the assets of Northern B.C. Power Company Ltd.

Ald. George Casey called this "delaying tactics."

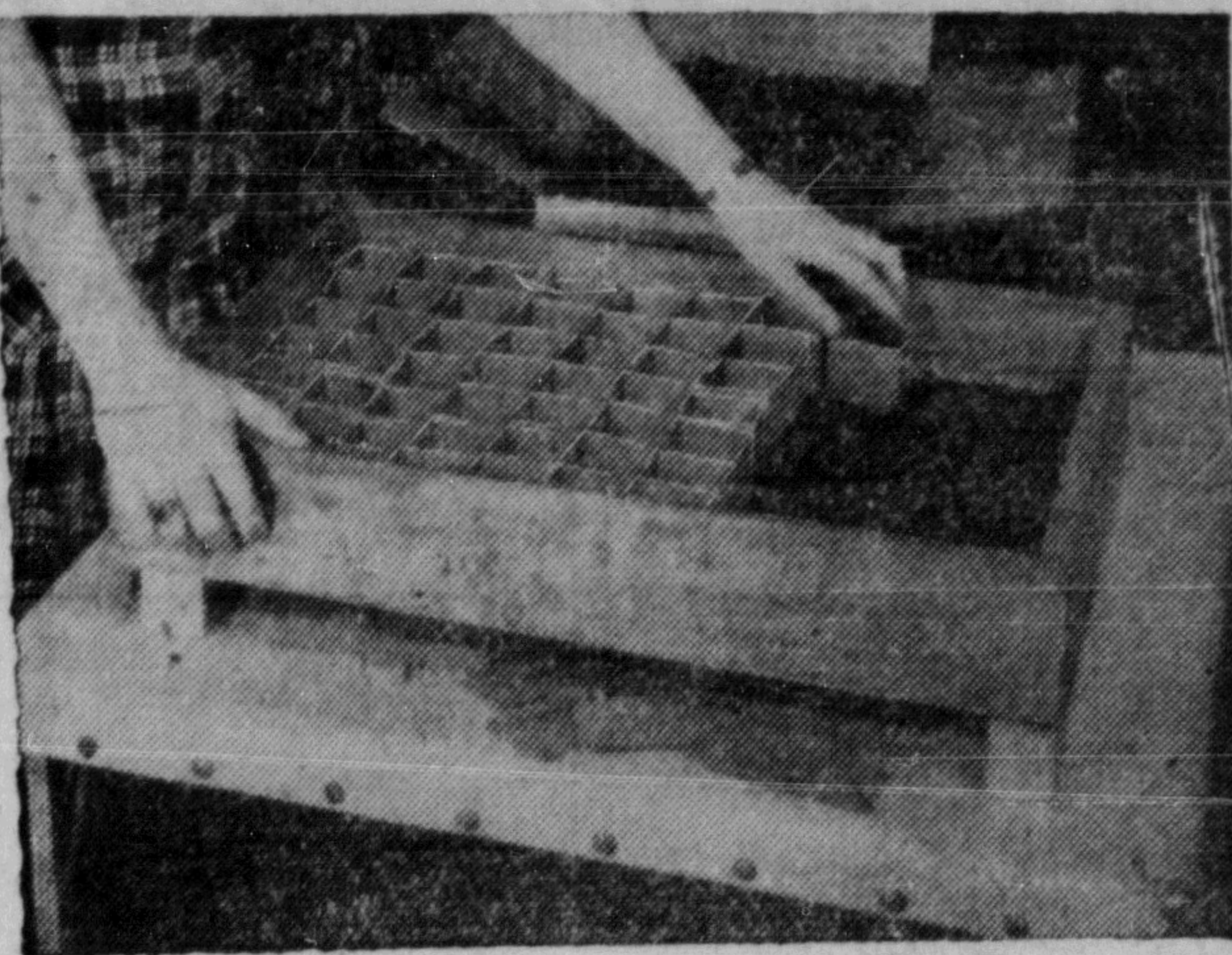

#### SEED BOX SHOULD BE DEEP ENOUGH TO NOURISH PLANTS

If you plan to start flower or vegetable seeds indoors this spring, before it is safe to sow them in the garden, don't pave the way of failure by using inadequate equipment.

Seeds can be sown on a moist piece of blotting paper, but they will not grow into plants without sufficient soil, or soil substitute, to allow their roots to develop without crowding. Too small a seed box may be little better than the blotting paper; it will sprout the seeds, but cannot provide them with nourishment for growth.

A stout wooden box which holds at least two inches of soil is adequate. The standard "flat" used for the purpose is sold knock-down, in sizes from 14x21 1/2 to 15 x 24 inches. These are easily put together by driving a few nails, and will grow plants to garden size without check.

To fill them, porous soil is required, or a substitute. Vermiculite and sphagnum moss are good substitutes, but neither has any nourishment on the plants. Food must be provided as soon as the plants have developed true leaves, otherwise the plants will die.

Soil will nourish the plants without chemical feeding and many amateurs prefer it for this reason. If you did not bring some of your best garden top soil into shelter last fall, then dig it during the first thaw, and allow it

#### Full-Time Assessor

Job of Revaluation Expected To Take Two Years

A full-time assessor will be engaged by the city following decision by the finance committee to re-assess the entire city. Ald. Mike Krueger, finance committee chairman, reported to council last night the job was expected to take two years.

Objection was raised to recommendation by Ald. Krueger that the assessor be appointed for two years "following which other duties be incorporated with this position."

Ald. George Casey said city council "should not tie itself down" to one assessor for such a long period.

Finance committee members explained the term was inserted "merely to give an idea of how long the actual assessing job will take." The stated term was later withdrawn from the motion.

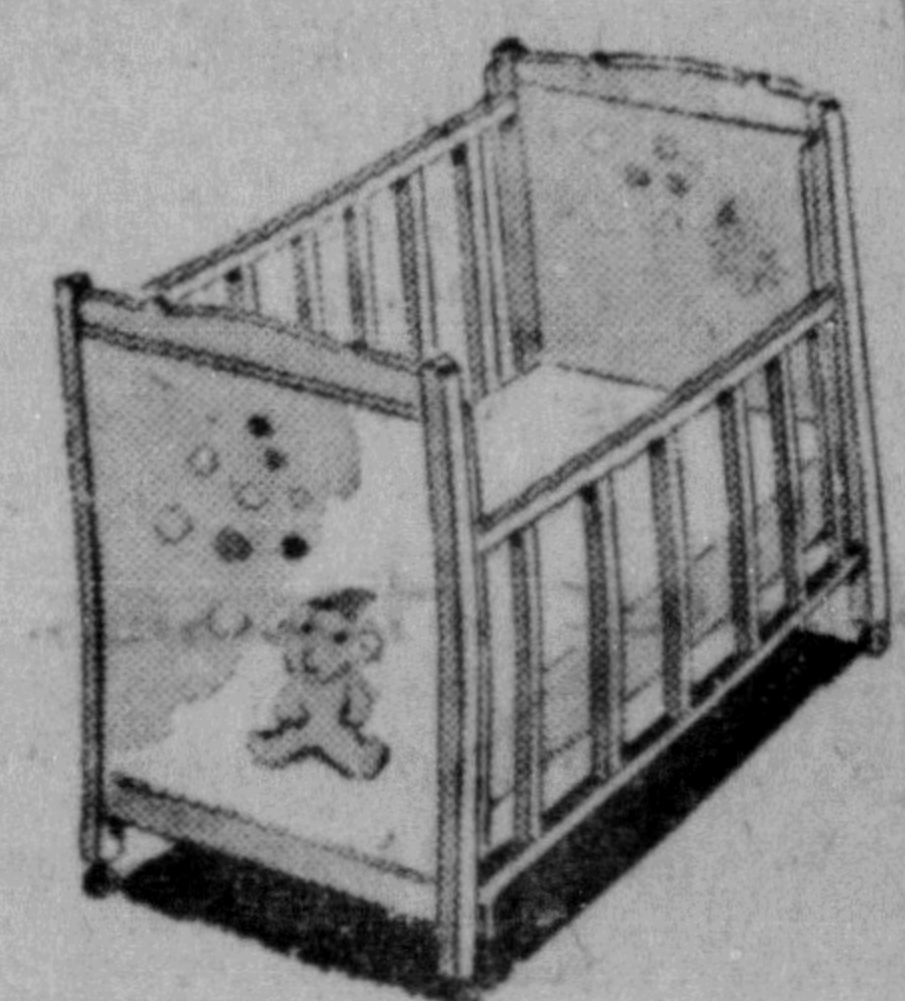

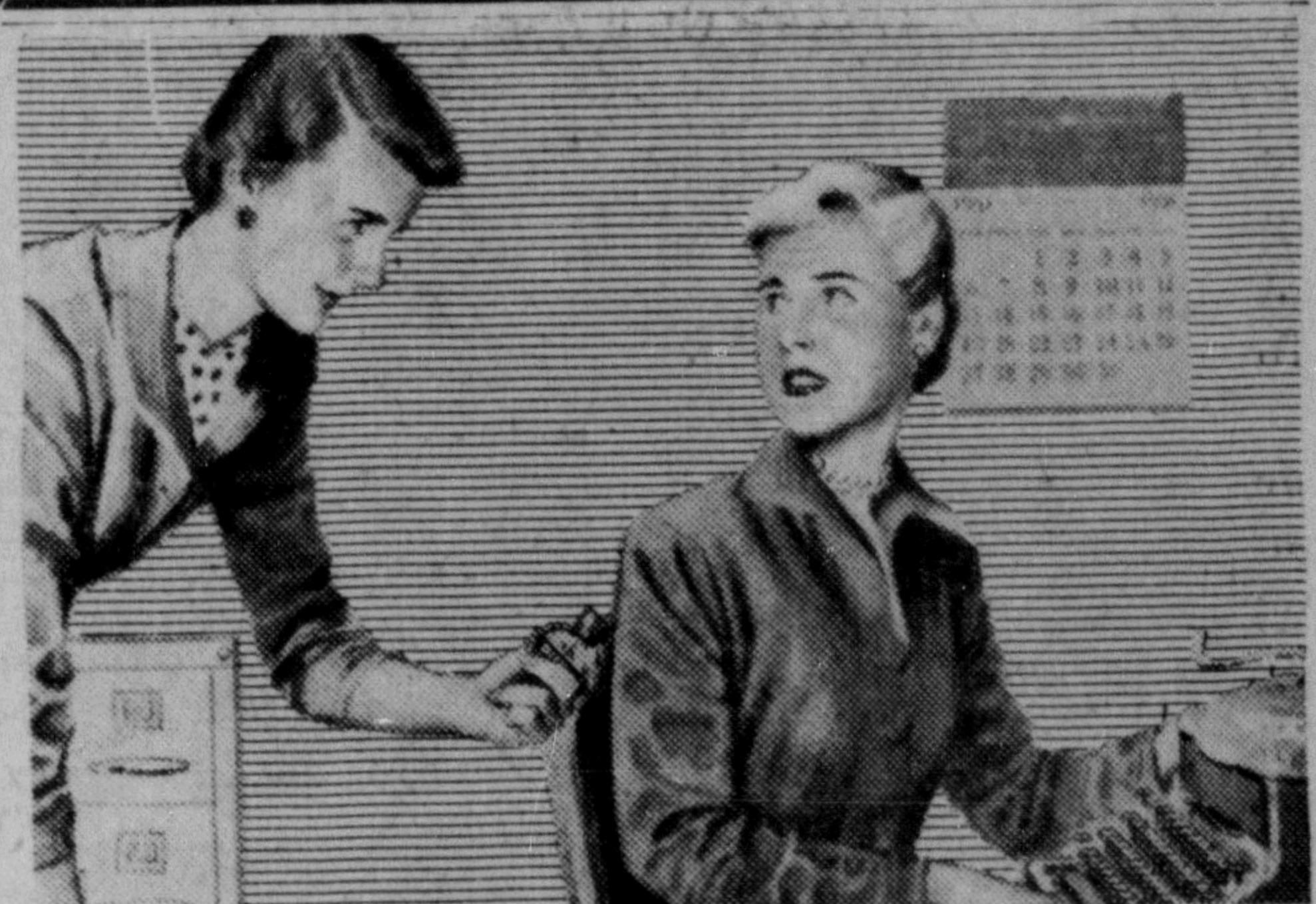
