OTTAWA ()-Finance Minister Abbott said Friday night his April 6 budget will be his last—positively.

"I thought the 1953 one was going to be the last, but this one is it," he said in an inter-

Mr. Abbott stayed on as finance minister for an extra year mainly to supervise the decennial revision of the Bank Act now before Perliament.
