BLACKWOOD on Bridge

Opening a No Trump Bid To Show Count Is Quite Often a Losing Proposition

Mr. Fusty, with his old-fashioned ways, says that the main thing he tries to tell his partner by his opening bid is his "count." For example, if he has the count for a no trump opening, he opens a no trump—regardless of his distribution.

In today's deal he had enough high cards and every suit stopped—but he had far from a no trump opening by today's standards.

Nevertheless, Mr. Fusty was quite proud of the results he got. He felt that the no trump small slam would not have been reached if he had not opened the bidding as he did.

PLENTY OF ENTRIES

Mr. Heinsite pointed out, however, that six no trump was not the top spot on the hand and that seven spades could have been made, as the cards were.

He explained that Mr. Fusty would win any opening lead and reverse the dummy. That is, he would set up the dummy hand rather than his own.

He had plenty of entries on the board so that he would ruff three of dummy's clubs in his own hand. After that operation dummy would have no losers.

LOSING PROPOSITION

Most players would open the South hand with one spade.

ther the knife could be responsible for the wound.

"I can see how that knife could fit perfectly in the wound," was the answer.

ANOTHER OPERATION

A gasp was heard in the courtroom when Dr. Greene told the court his patient, Mrs. Beynon, had been readmitted to hospital yesterday for another operation.

Mr. Brown advised the court later that Dr. Greene had told him Mrs. Beynon would not be in condition to give evidence "for at least another eight days."

Dr. Greene testified he had asked Byrne on "two separate occasions" regarding cause of Mrs. Beynon's condition. The woman, he said, had been lying in her state for several hours.

"At first, the accused said the woman had fallen down a flight of stairs outside the house."

The second time, Dr. Greene had asked him—after briefly examining the victim, Byrne had said:

"Why ask me?"

RIDICULOUS

Const. D. W. McArthur, RCMP, said he had been the first police officer on the premises following the call.

He quoted accused as having said:

"It is ridiculous. She was drunk and had fallen down the stairs twice."

Cpl. Anderson described the living room of the Beynon home in "great disorder, broken bottles lying around and the floor covered with sticky substance which stuck to the bottom of one's shoes."

Accused was later taken into custody and arrested that evening for "wounding with intent," said the coroner.

Other witness was Marcel Baril, a pulp mill shipper, who testified about a party at the Beynon home the night in question, and told the court of an argument between Byrne and Mrs. Beynon.

Liquor on the premises, he said, was a case of beer and a bottle of rum.

Another witness, Garnet Brush, a logger, said he had accompanied Mickey McGuire to the Beynon house at about noon February 15. McGuire had visited the house earlier in the morning. With Brush, it was the first visit.

The logger had asked Byrne what had happened.

When accused had answered, "it's none of your business," an altercation followed, witness said.

"I thought he had kicked the woman and in a sudden burst of anger I slapped him, or pushed him around."

Const. Philip Crouch testified to pictures he had taken of the Beynon home.

Mrs. Willa Ray is defence counsel. Case was adjourned to March 19.
