

Lower Down Payment on Homes Urged

OTTAWA (CP)—The Commons' speech debate today ended what is expected to be its final day after three weeks of speeches on the state of the nation.

Seven back-benchers took part in the debate Wednesday, carrying forward votes expected later on two opposition motions of non-confidence. A CCF non-confidence motion was defeated last week 156 to 36.

The end of the debate will open the way for consideration of government legislation.
