

Lower Down Payment on Homes Urged

OTTAWA (CP)—The Commons' speech debate today ended with what is expected to be its final day after three weeks of speeches on the state of the nation.

Seven back-benchers took part in the debate Wednesday, carrying it toward votes expected late today on two opposition motions of non-confidence. A CCF non-confidence motion was defeated last week 156 to 36.

The end of the debate will clear the way for consideration of government legislation.

The proposed measure, dealing with housing, was referred to Wednesday by the Broadview, Sask. member who said the main weakness in the proposed legislation is the requirement for a

down payment of 10 per cent on the first \$8,000 and 30 per cent on the remainder of the value of the house.

This would make the down payment at least \$1,400 on the cheapest house available.

He suggested the down payment should be 10 per cent on all houses up to \$10,000.

The question of increasing unemployment insurance benefits is under study, Labor Minister Gregg said in a tabled Commons report. He also said that the insurance fund at Oct. 31 amounted to \$903,000,000.
