BLACKWOOD on
BRIDGE

 Expert Makes Free Use of the Penalty Double

In no other part of the game is partnership co-
 operation more important than in the field of the
 penalty double. I predict a steadily dwindling bank
 account for those who never double for penalties un-
 less they have the opposing bid set three or four
 tricks in their own hands.

The winning player doubles
 much closer than that. In fact,
 in certain favorable situations
 he practically doubles on sus-
 picion. Such a situation would
 be where he is not vulnerable,
 the opponents are, and the
 doubled bid, if made, would not
 score a game. The double of
 two clubs or two diamonds, for
 example.

The point is that the partner
 of the doubler is obligated to
 take the double off, if his hand
 is not suited to defensive play.
 Two good reasons for refusing to
 stand your partner's double are
 length in the suit your partner
 has bid and shortness in the
 suit bid by the opponent.

CORRECT CALL
 In today's deal Mr. Abel op-
 ened the bidding with one heart.
 Mr. New responded with one
 spade. That was the correct call,
 because the South hand is too
 strong for a single heart raise
 and not strong enough for a
 double raise. Mr. New probably
 planned to bid spades on the
 first round and raise hearts on
 the second, thus telling partner
 that his hand was good enough
 for two bids.

But his decision to pass two
 diamonds, doubled, was disas-
 trous. Surely it stands out that
 his hand was worth more for
 playing hearts than it was for
 defending against a diamond
 contract.

Probably Mr. New, rather
 fancied his lone diamond, figur-
 ing that the fewer diamonds he
 held, the more Mr. Abel had. He
 usually works out that the few-
 er trumps you have, the more
 likely it is that dummy will
 come up with a nice trump hold-
 ing.

ICE-COLD HEARTS
 Against the two diamond con-
 tract Mr. Abel led his singleton
 spade and Mr. Dale won with
 the ace over Mr. New's king. A
 small diamond was led and Mr.
 Abel went in with the king. He
 made a desperate return of a
 small heart and Mr. New won
 with the queen and led back a
 spade.

Mr. Dale ducked and Mr. Abel
 ruffed. He got one more trump
 trick and the ace of clubs later,
 but that was all. The defenders
 won only three diamonds, a
 heart and a club.

The trouble was they shouldn't
 have been defending. They
 should have been playing four
 hearts, which was ice-cold.
