Mrs. Smith succeeds Mrs. Sheldford Dorton in the presidency of the club which last fall changed its name from the Women's Canadian Club, opening its doors to men members, with considerable success.

In her report on the year's work, Mrs. Dorton noted that formation of a Canadian Club in Prince George is in the offing, and said that if the new club is formed, a northern B.C. circuit will be formed, giving both clubs a better chance to hear speakers sent out by the national organization.

The meeting also was told of the biennial conference of the National Association of Canadian Clubs, to be held in Winnipeg in June.

Mrs. Smith was named delegate to the session, which because of its location, affords the club almost its first opportunity to have representation. Usually, the national sessions are held in the east.

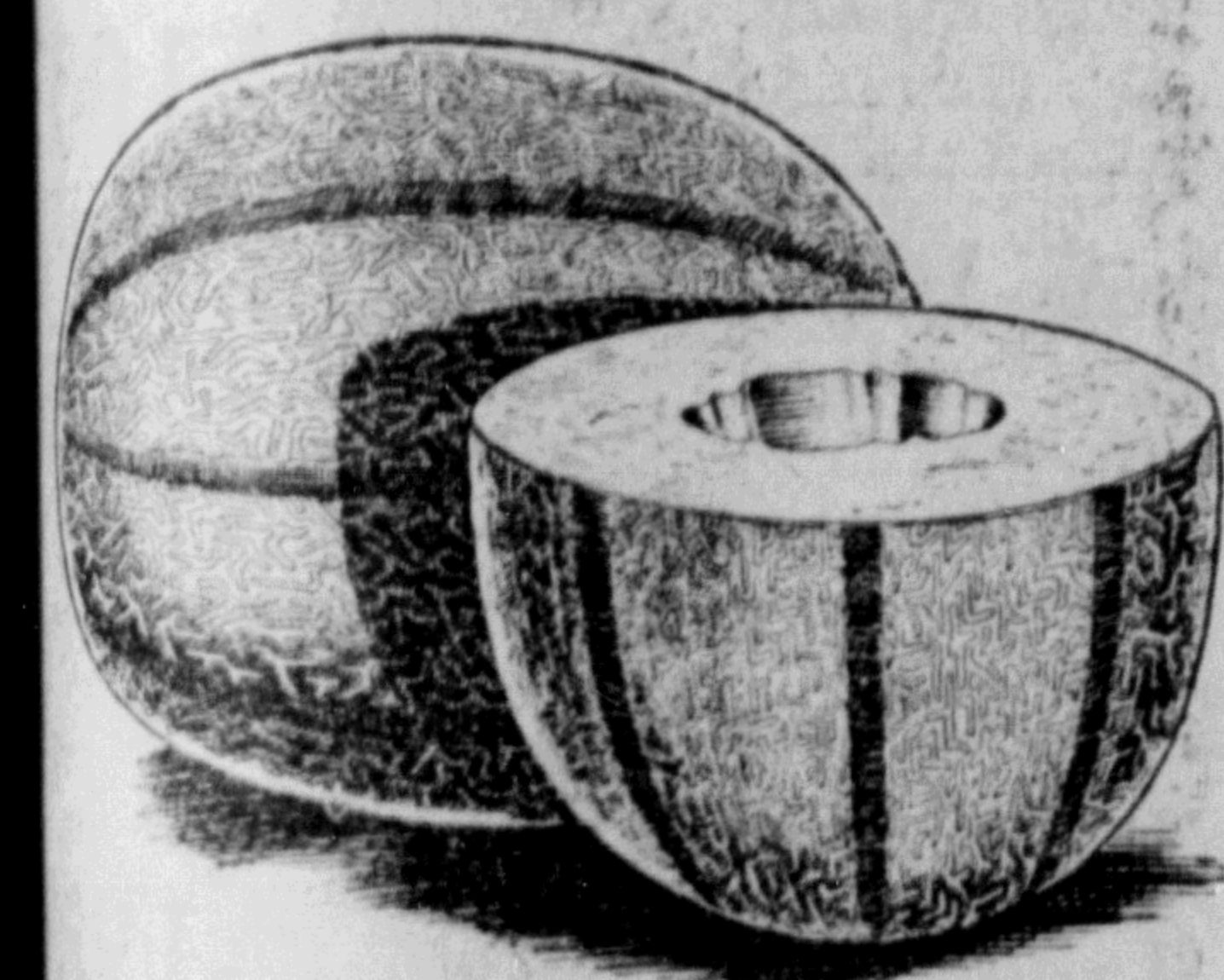
