Wings, Leafs Break Even

DETROIT—Detroit Red Wings and Toronto Maple Leafs shared honors in National Hockey League week-end play. The Maple Leafs downed the Red Wings at Toronto Saturday night by a healthy 5 to 3 but the Wings came back on their home ice Sunday night to edge the Leafs 2 to 1. It left the Red Wings still with a substantial twelve-point margin over the Maple Leafs in the league leadership contest.

Meantime, the Montreal Canadiens are still close at the heels of the Maple Leafs for runner-up position with a single point separating them. The Canadiens swamped the long-suffering Chicago Black Hawks at the Montreal Forum Saturday night and went to New York to play the Rangers to a two-all draw last night.

The Boston Bruins climbed into a tie with the Rangers for fourth place by eking out a 5 to 4 victory over the Black Hawks in Boston last night.

Toronto will be at Boston for the next scheduled National Hockey League game tomorrow night.

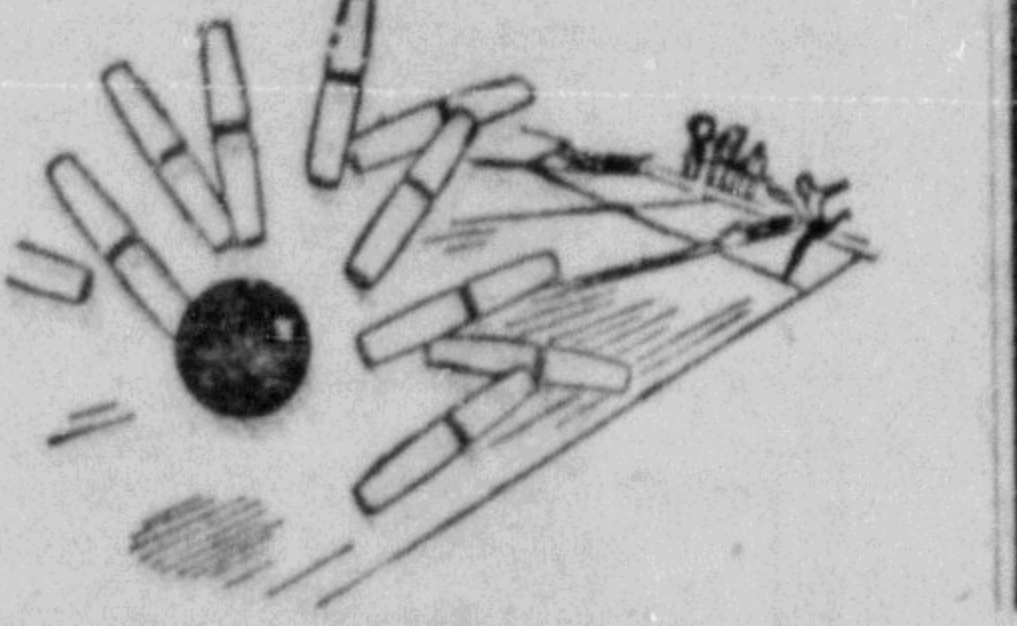
