Three of the five bodies found in the ruins of the fire-ravaged King George Hotel, destroyed early Sunday, are believed to have been identified.

They are listed as Henry Morgan, Alec Megetto, 60, and says he has not seen his room-Thomas Rizuk, 46.

A fourth, a woman, is believed to be a Mrs. Peters.

They are the only four unaccounted for in a list of 51 occupants compiled today by Theodore (Fred) Prystay, proprietor of the rooming house. The fifth body is believed to be that of a visitor, one of two
