Two Teams Move up After Tie

NEW YORK (CP)—A fluke long shot by Gordie Howe, with less than two minutes left, gave Detroit Red Wings a 1-1 tie with the New York Rangers in a hard hitting National Hockey League game last night. Howe's shot, a floater from just inside the blue line, appeared easy for Goalie Eddie (The Cat) Francis to handle. However, he let the puck slip through his glove.

The goal, Howe's ninth in seven games and his thirty-fourth of the season, was the first scored by the Red Wings on New York ice in 188 minutes and 11 seconds of hockey between the teams.

New York appeared headed for victory early in the third period when Ed Slowinski worked a passing play, with Gaye Stewart and Don Raleigh, to beat Terry Sawchuk while Ted Lindsay was serving a penalty hooking. The tie boosted Detroit's first place lead over Toronto to 15 points and enabled the Rangers to take a two point lead in the standings over the fifth place Boston Bruins.

Train For Olympics

Seven Countries Have Athletes Ready In Chicago Area

CHICAGO (AP)—Midwestern United States is a busy training ground for foreign athletes hopeful of representing their own countries in the 1952 Olympic Games at Helsinki.

An Associated Press survey disclosed that at least 17 athletes from seven different countries are performing at colleges in this area.

Canada with 10 natives, seven of them at the University of Michigan, tops the list which also includes two South African athletes, and one each from Sweden, Norway, New Zealand, Finland and Panama.

Olympic rules require competitors to be nationals or naturalized citizens of the country they represent.

There are some lively Olympic prospects in the foreign set on midwestern campuses.

Take Michigan's Don McEwen, Drake's Jim Lavery, and Iowa's Richard Ferguson, all of Canada; Purdue's Denis Johansson of Finland; Oklahoma's Neville Price from South Africa, and Illinois' Cirilo McSweeney from Panama.

McEwen, formerly of Ottawa and Halifax, has won seven NCAA and Big Ten distance titles with a 9:01.9 outdoor two-mile clocking to his credit. He was 1950's all-college two-miler.

Just as McEwen captains Michigan, Lavery is Drake track captain and one of the fastest 440 runners in the U.S. His best clocking is :47.6, made in the NCAA trials last year.

Johansson has learned a lot about American running as a sort of third-place chaperone in the Don Gehrmann-Fred Wilt file feud. He hopes to qualify for the Finnish Olympic team in the 1500 and 5,000 metres.

McSweeney, 22-year-old junior, won both the Big Ten and outdoor 440 championship as a

sophomore last year when his quarter-mile defeat came at the hands of Al Rankin; and sprinter Ross Coats.

Price, 22-year-old Oklahoma freshman from East London, South Africa, holds the British Empire broad jump title and also is a sprinter. Ferguson, slender 20-year-old Iowa freshman from Toronto was Canadian three-mile champion in 1949 and 1950.

Michigan's Canadian contingent also includes sophomore John Ross with a 4:12 clocking in his first collegiate mile try; George Lynch, a 10,000-meter hopeful; shot-putter Roy Pella;
