

Canadian Trade Group Off to Japan

VANCOUVER (CP)—An attitude of "show us what you have to offer" will prevail when 60 Canadian business men go window-shopping through the principal cities of Japan.

An advance guard of 12 is already in the Orient and the other 48 took off yesterday, the

largest trade delegation to make the trip since the Second World War.

Heading the contingent is Grant W. G. McConachie, president of the Vancouver Board of Trade and head of Canadian Pacific Airlines.

Any contracts negotiated will

come under the new Canadian-Japanese trade treaty. Japanese goods coming here under preferred nation status, will benefit from lower tariffs.

Last year Canada exported \$119,000,000 worth of goods, while importing only \$13,800,000. The group will spend three of its 13 days overseas at Osaka visiting the International Trade Fair.

H. B. R. Kirkpatrick, whose company imported steel, hardware, toys and china in the 1930's, said:

"We understand they have expanded and perfected their manufacturing. From the samples we have had since the war, they have a lot of know-how."

A. D. Richardson, president of a wholesale food brokerage, said his company has been doing "a very nice business with Japan" and the visit will provide him with a chance to "meet people and answer questions."

Beefs About Refereeing Highlight NHL Series

MONTREAL (CP)—The penalty-and-power-play series, probably one of the most unique in Stanley Cup annals opens its Montreal stand tonight with no let-up in off-stage squawks about the refereeing.

It's small wonder that the officials, instead of some unfortunate players, have been made the goats so far in this tight tussle between the cup-defending Montreal Canadiens and the Detroit Red Wings.

In the two games in Detroit, each settled by a 3-1 score, first in favor of the Wings and then Canadiens, not one of the total eight goals was scored while 12 players were on the ice. The Red Wings counted one goal when one of their own men was in the penalty box.

With penalties playing such an important part, the roars and bellows were bound to come. Coach Dick Irvin sounded off first. His team lost the Sunday game, handled by referee Bill Chadwick.

The outraged Montreal coach proclaimed that "it's strange opposing teams get penalties until the Red Wings are in front." Irvin followed that with some succinct comment about "evening things up."

BLAST FROM ADAMS

Detroit's loss Tuesday night, when referee Red Storey handled the game, brought a blast from general manager Jack Adams to the effect that Storey was never any good and as a Montreal man would of course favor Canadiens.

To cap this, Bruce Norris, co-owner of the Red Wings, announced he would file a letter of protest over the officiating, the protest directed to president Campbell of the National Hockey League.

The two games produced 25 penalties, 14 against Canadiens and 11 against the Red Wings. Canadiens had eight in the first game to Detroit's seven; six in the second game to Detroit's four, but two of the Detroit penalties overlapped and Canadiens quickly whipped in two of their three goals.

Now that the best-of-seven series has moved to Montreal for games tonight and Saturday, the Red Wings must try to win on foreign ice, as Canadiens did in Detroit. Home ice has been good to Canadiens this season. In seven NHL meetings between the two clubs, Canadiens won six and Detroit one. In Detroit, the Montrealers had two ties and suffered five losses. Plane Damaged At Sandspit

SANDSPIT, B.C. (CP)—A U.S. C-46 cargo plane made an emergency landing here Tuesday after a propeller flew off in mid-air, ripping a gaping hole in one wing and wrecking all controls on the left side.

The pilot, Joseph M. Halsey of Seattle, and three airmen aboard the west air transport plane were uninjured.

More than two-thirds of an 11,000-pound cargo of food bound for Anchorage, Alaska, from Seattle was jettisoned before the plane touched down at this Queen Charlotte Island air field.

The C-46 was about 15 minutes flying time from Sandspit, 500 miles north of Vancouver, when the accident occurred.
