

"Our birds are shipped direct from Edmonton," one retailer "Only a small number of films explained. "They are absolutely tops in quality. Contrary to the information in that report, we also have an excellent supply of turkeys under 12 pounds."

The report carried yesterday was based on a national survey which stated that B.C. outlets were hit this year by a drop in the prairie crop, and that small birds were in short supply. Prince Rupert, however, has not been affected by this condition.
