SHORT, STRAIGHT ROWS BEST FOR HOME VEGETABLE PLOT



Measure Rows Exactly, to Make Them Straight and Parallel.

In small gardens there is a definite advantage in planting vegetables in short rows, 25 feet or less. In an oblong garden, where the short dimension is north and south permitting rows to run in this direction, the owner is fortunate.

The advantage of short rows is secondary in importance to the distribution of sunshine, however, and where the long dimension of the garden space is north and south, it is best to run the rows that way, breaking the length by a path, every 25 feet.

Commercial growers cultivating with power machines favor long rows, because it lessens the time required for turning machines around. But the home gardener gains no such advantage; and when a row is longer than is required for a single planting of a vegetable, he must divide a row between two crops, which is inconvenient, or fill out the row with one, and thus overplant.

Indeed, much of the waste of garden space and effort caused by overproduction, may be traced to the twin temptations, to "use up the packet," when half of a packet of seed would produce the required crop; or "fill up the row," when half of a garden would be sufficient.

Short rows have another advantage, which is real, though it may seem trivial. In cultivating you naturally take one row at a stint, and rest when

Mr. New Reserves for a Big Loss

Mr. New, the avid kibitzer, is a great man for latching on to every new convention or bidding device. There is considerable merit to most of these new ideas. The thing to do is to add them to your game if they seem worthy.

But Mr. New goes beyond that. As each new convention "comes out," he devises a complete new system around it, thus giving it more importance than its originators had in mind.

One of these ideas is the "reverse." Someone applied that word to the bidding sequence where a player opens with one of a suit and later bids a higher ranking suit than the first, in such a manner as to force his partner to go one level higher

in order to make a simple preference for the first suit.

For example, you bid a diamond, your partner bids a spade and then you bid two hearts. If partner has a fairly weak hand and likes diamonds better he needs to go to the three level to express that.

You need a very good hand to bid like this. Not because you are "reversing" but simply because you need more to make nine tricks than you do to make eight tricks.

In today's deal Mr. Champion was entitled to believe that Mr. New had at least five hearts and four spades, plus a big hand. His jump to four hearts was justified.

The hand blew up in Mr. New's face when the partnership proved to have only seven trumps with the balance badly bunched in Mr. Dale's hand. The result was down three which was very sad, especially since three no trump was a laydown.

"Why did you open with one heart?" Mr. Champion demanded angrily.

"Because," replied Mr. New, "I wanted to reverse to show you a big hand."

Mr. Champion snorted in disgust. "You don't have to bid your suits in the wrong order to tell me that," he barked. "That's the trouble with you guys. You think the best bidding is the most complicated bidding."

"In my opinion the right bidding on the hand is one no trump by you and three no trump by me."

I agree with Mr. Champion.
