Allies Regain Lost West Front Ground

No Confirmation of Red Claim of Sinking Two Warships

SEOUL (Canadian Press)-Communist troops jabbed at advanced Allied positions all across Korea today, hitting with a beefed-up company at one point on the western front.

Stormy skies restricted air war but on the ground pre-dawn Red attacks knocked Allied infantrymen out of two positions northwest of Yonchon on the western front and one near Mundung Valley on the east. The Allies later regained the lost ground.

The Communists claimed to have sunk two Allied warships on the east coast but this was not confirmed.

Premier Johnson Well Pleased With Proceeds

VICTORIA (P-British Columbia has negotiated a \$30,000,000 loan in the United States with a group of underwriters headed by the First Boston Corporation of New York, Premier Byron Johnson announced Wednesday. "A most satisfactory price was obtained which, in view of present market conditions, aptly indicates the strong confidence in British Columbia held by investors in the United States," the

Premier said. The loan consists of \$7,500,000 three percent serial debentures payable equally in five years to 1957 and \$22,500,000 three and five-eighth percent sinking fund

debentures maturing in 1977. The cost to the province of the serial debentures averaged at an effective rate of 3.44 percent in United States as compared with a rate of 3.5 percent for a similar short term security floated

OTTAWA (Canadian Press)—Canada is joining in a three-way arrangement with the United States and Britain to build, equip and man a squadron of F-86 Sabre jet fighters for the North Atlantic Treaty

The announcement, made simultaneously here and at Washington and London Wednesday .091/2 night, said Canada will build planes at the big Canadair plant in Montreal, the United States will supply the engines and other equipment and fighters will be manned by British fliers. The announcement, made

jointly by Defence Production Minister Howe and Defence Minister Claxton, did not disclose the number or production schedules of the planes but it is understood arrangements will "some hundreds" of

The announcement was seen here as the first development following a statement earlier this month by External Affairs Minister L. B. Pearson that Canada planned to enlarge her aid to European defence.
