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AB Dawes To Attend Coronation

Able Seaman Edward Dawes, of HMCS Chatham reserve navy personnel, has been selected to attend the coronation of Queen Elizabeth II in England June 2 as a member of the Canadian Navy team.

A signal has been received here from Naval Headquarters advising of the final selection from the reserve personnel here. Details of passage arrangements will be promulgated by Naval Headquarters at a later date.

AB Dawes is leaving on March 7 for a two-week quartermasters' course at HMCS Stadacona, Halifax, and if he qualifies it will make him eligible for leading seaman.

A letter was received from E. T. Applewhite, Skeena MP, addressed to AB Dawes, saying that if a stopover can be arranged in Ottawa on his way to or from the port of embarkation, he would conduct him personally through the House of Commons.

All naval personnel in transit from coast to coast are permitted to have a stopover of 48 hours.

Only one representative to the Coronation will be selected from Chatham. Of all 22 divisions across Canada, there were only five officers, eight chief and petty officers and 30 leading seamen selected.

In naval training, Lieutenant (P) T. C. Scheer and Acting-Lieutenant (P) G. N. Jernyn left during the week for HMCS Shearwater, one of the RCN's naval air stations for helicopter and refresher courses in naval aviation. Shearwater is situated near Halifax.

One of Chatham's biggest assets in the future will be its naval band which is in the process of being recruited into the division. This band will be under the leadership of P. Lien as a chief petty officer who will co-ordinate the future movements of the band under Commissioned Officer (SB) H. Huber. Chatham is allowed to carry 20 bandmen on strength.

All extra uniforms have been ordered from naval stores in Esquimaux for the band and hand instruments previously held by Chatham will be surveyed and returned to naval stores if they are not in good condition.

A full set of orchestral instruments may be demanded from naval stores. The new band attended its first drill night on Monday evening in the drill hall.

This week Chatham received its new station wagon from Oshawa, Ontario, and it is now in service with the new panel truck. The next arrival will be a new three-ton truck, due in the near future.

'Coronation Look' Popular Style Among Canadian Dress Designers

Coronation-conscious Canadian women are finding much that pleases in the 1953 spring fashions.

Most centres report great popularity for the "Coronation look"—hats, coats and dresses all liberally sprinkled with a variety of sequins, pearls and other gems, a Canadian Press survey shows.

In Western Canada the crown motif is featured in bright prints and throughout the country the perennial favorite, navy blue, takes on added significance as a Coronation color.

Despite the royal theme prices are remaining at the '52 level and fashion centres find brisk demand on spring designs, probably due to an extremely mild winter.

Cotton prints, denims and linens are finding favor among dress enthusiasts although all materials and weaves have been incorporated into the new lines. There is a definite swing to smaller, finer designs in prints, away from the large florals of recent years.

Pastels are the leaders in the color parade from Montreal to Vancouver. Pale blues, pinks, cream, greens, whites, greys and yellows are popular with an occasional dash of bright gold.

Suits are simple with light lines while many feature a square-cut "box" design, particularly in jackets. Tweeds are well received and also gabardines and worsteds. Most practical is the straight, slim skirt for combination with a light sweater or blouse.

Solid-color coats in mohair, tweed, cashmere or the ever-popular camel hair are the spring stars and here again the

pastel tints are tops. While there is no definite trend in hats they are sure to be tiny and tipped, either to the front or the side. Lighter shades are dominant and they should be decorated with jewels or flowers.

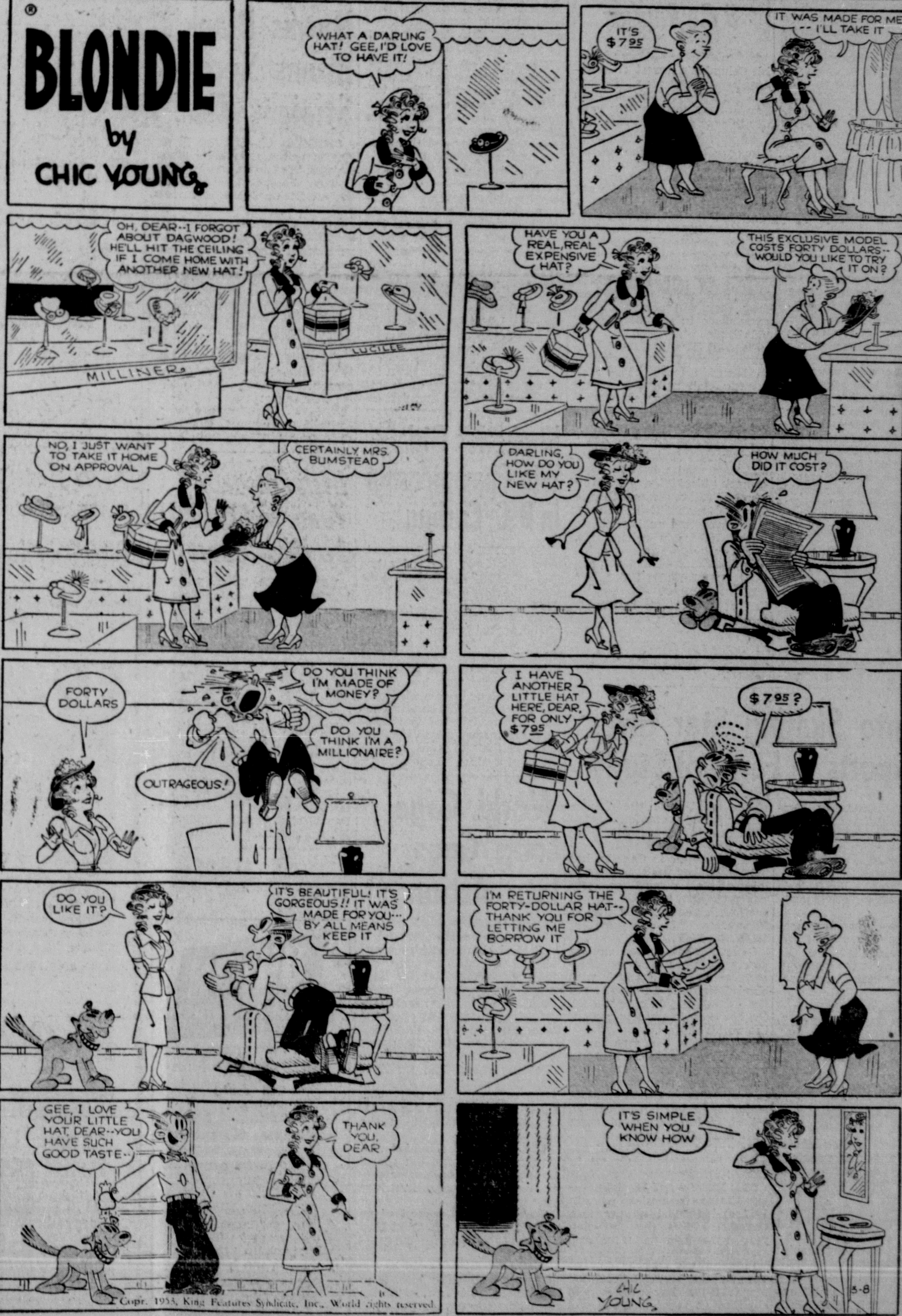
