Young Artists Again Offered Scholarships

Scholarships to assist young Canadians in obtaining advanced training in music, painting and dramatic art are being offered by the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association for the sixth consecutive year, and applications for the awards are now being sought.

The scholarships, valued from \$500 to \$2,000 each are offered to Canadians between 20 and 30 years of age. Since 1949, they have assisted 19 young Canadian students in studies abroad.

The scholarships are open to Canadian citizens between 20 and 30 years of age on July 15, 1954, who are qualified to take advanced training in drama, painting or musical composition. Preference is given applicants who lack financial resources for studies abroad.

It is hoped also that a start will be made by then on the separate quarters which the squadron is planning to construct for its classroom work. Drills are carried out in the Armory.

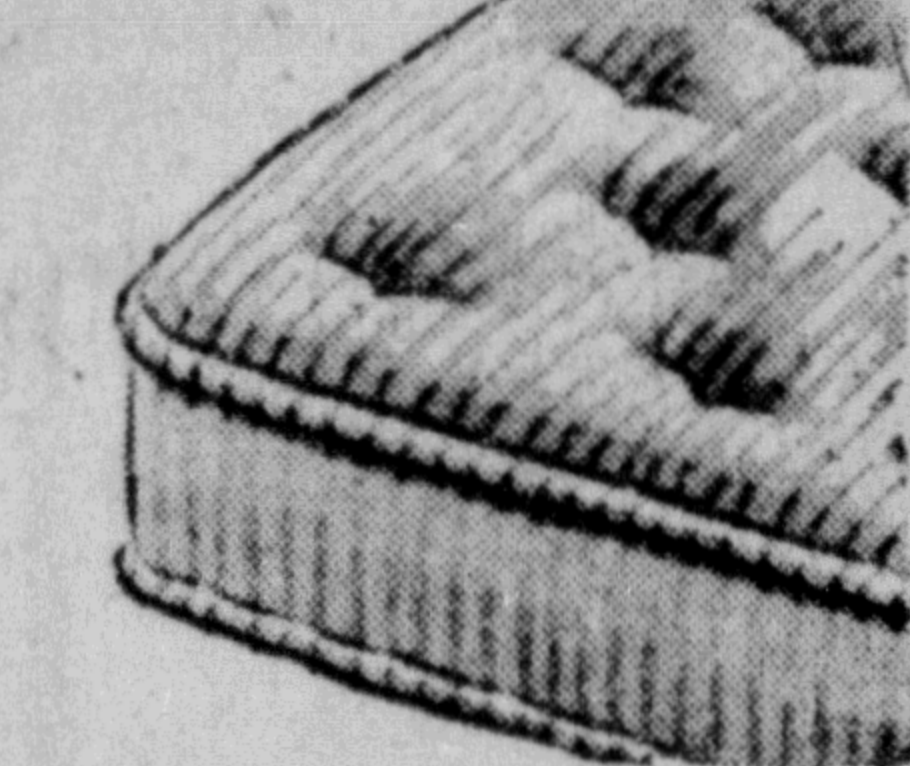
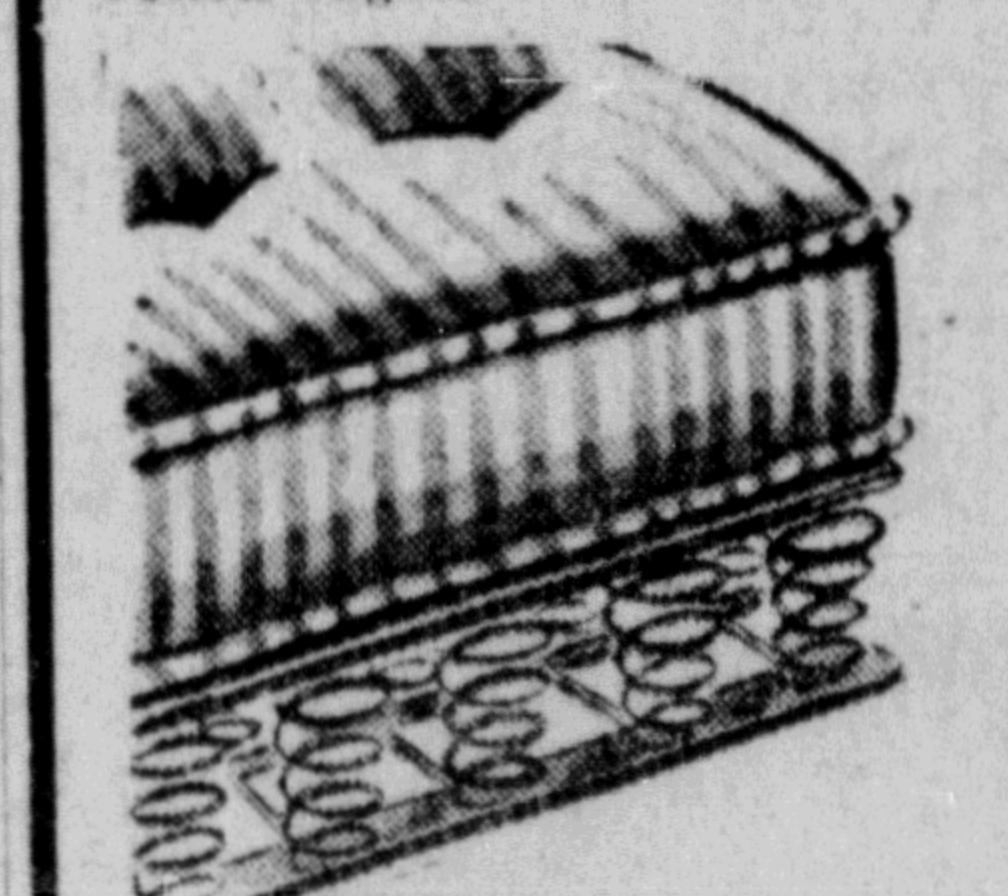

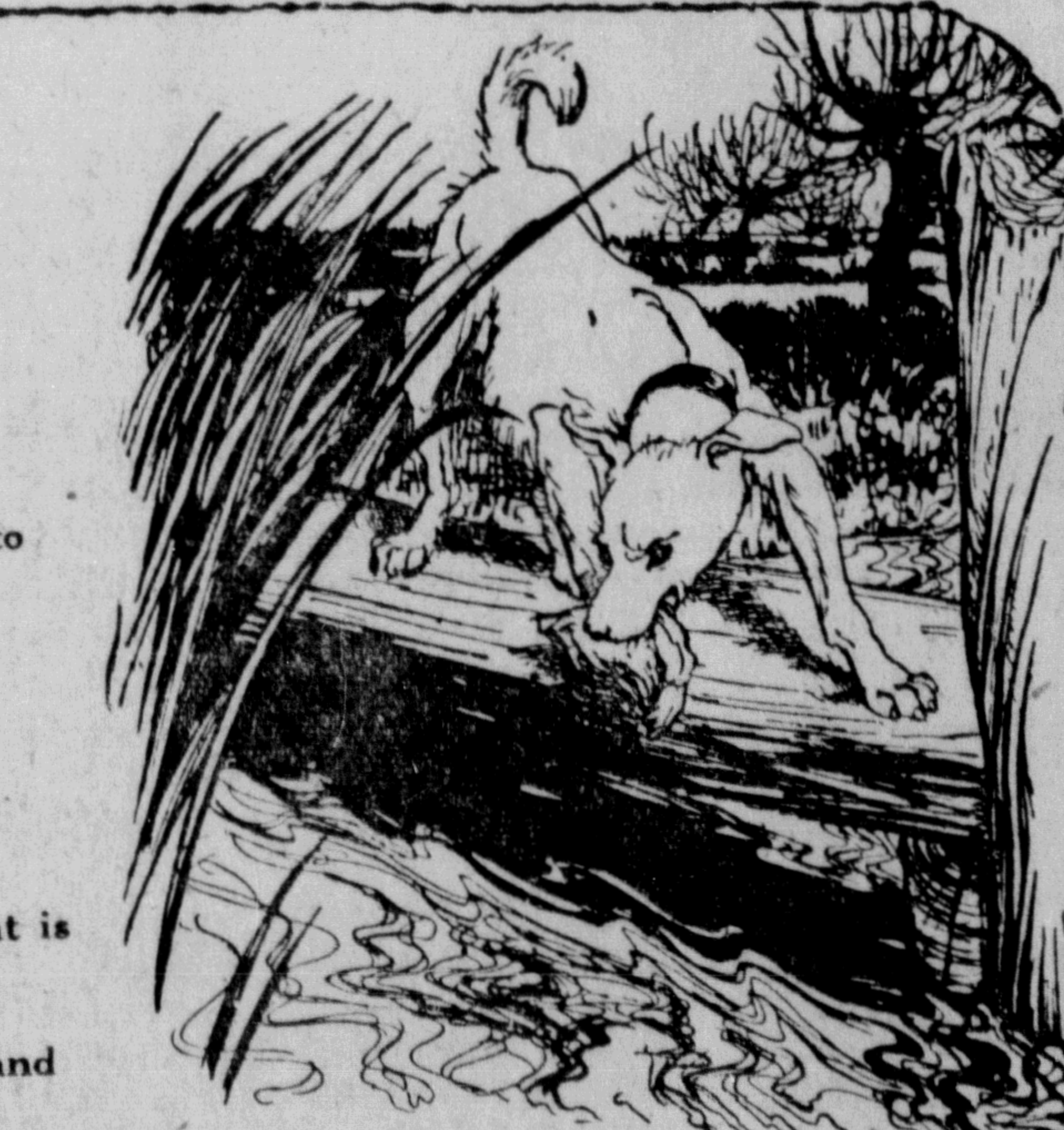
