OTTAWA DIARY By NORMAN M. MacLEOD

It is one step forward and two steps back for the Unemployment Insurance Fund these days. On the first of January last the fund had just \$79,000,000 to go to reach the even billion-dollar figure. As it builds up with rapidly—as much as \$12,000,000 a month in times of good employment—its chances of passing the billion-dollar milestone around mid-summer seemed reasonably bright.

But on the first of April last—three months later—the fund had approximately \$110,000,000 to go in order to reach a billion dollars. In other words, its cash balance had slumped by some \$30,000,000.

That is what a mere "recession" had done to the fund in the brief space of some 90 days. The demonstration of the rapidity with which the Unemployment Insurance Fund can melt away under a moderate test has come as a distinct shock to Parliament Hill authorities. If the fund drops so rapidly when faced by a mere recession, the obvious question is how it would fare if it had to meet a real depression? Government officials aren't too happy when they contemplate the answer.

The real truth is that the past months of recession have given the Unemployment Insurance Fund its first really important test since its organization, and that it can't exactly be said to have emerged with colors flying. At least two serious weaknesses in the scheme have been exposed.

The first is the inadequacy of the term of benefit. The recession experience has shown that most of the unemployed had exhausted their benefit rights long before they found work again. And even in the period during which they drew benefits, the sums paid to them were inadequate for either their individual or their family needs.

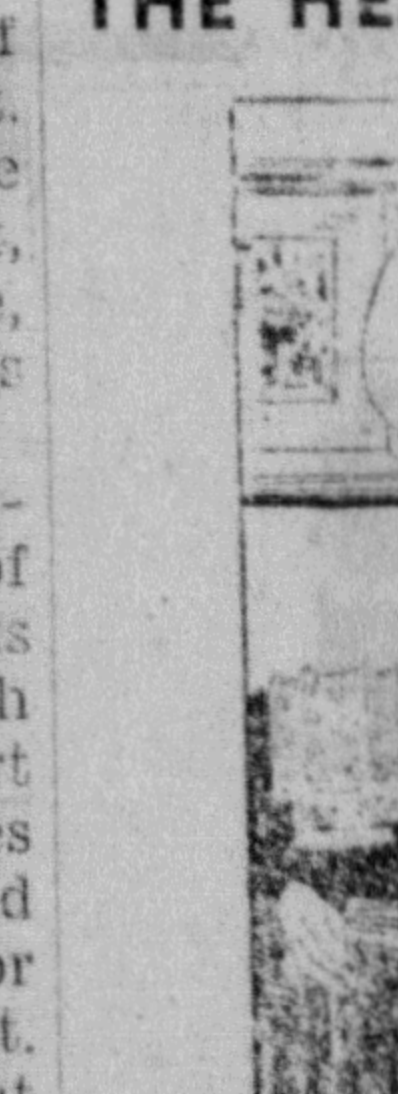

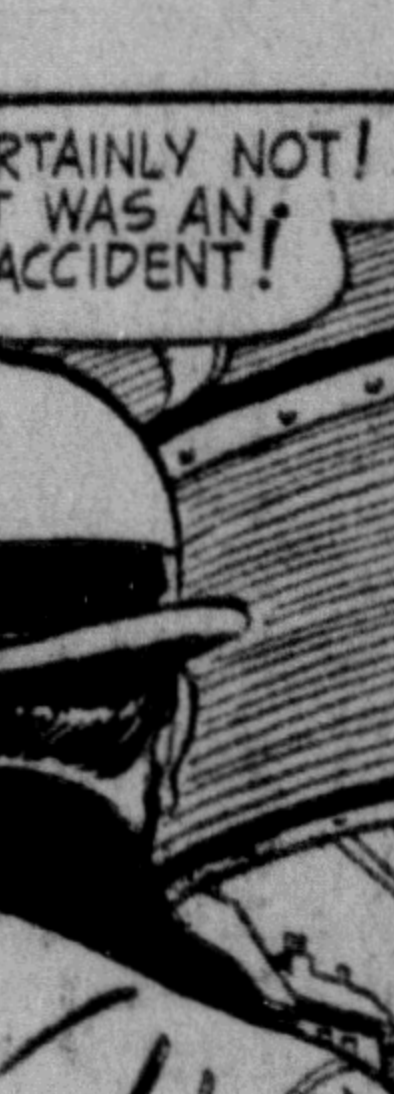
