
Employees Protest Sale of System

VANCOUVER (CP) - Government telegraph and telephone system employees Thursday called on the federal government to drop plans to self its sprawling communications system linking interior and northern British Columbia centres

The Vancouver council of the Amalgamated Civil Servants of Canada, which represents the system's 250 employees, said in a statement today that an abpeal against the proposed sale has been sent to the transport department at Ottawa.

The department announced Nov. 24 that it planned to sell the system to the B.C. Tele phone Company and the Canadian National Telegraphs for \$1.500,000, the cost to be divided evenly between the two.

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
