Shuba Sure Of Job if Knee Holds

VERO BEACH, Fla. (AP)—George Shuba rolled up the left leg of the trousers above his knee, exposing a three-inch purplish scar near the kneecap.

"It all depends upon this ugly little thing here," The Brooklyn Dodgers outfielder said. "I know I could win a regular job on this club if only I were sure of this knee. The doctor who performed the operation last November assured me the knee would be as good as new by the time the season opened. But it still feels sore."

"Funny thing, it doesn't bother me a bit when I'm batting, even before they removed the cartilage. It's just when I start after a ball in the outfield, or get set to throw it back to the infield, or when I run the bases. There were times last year when the pain was so great I dreaded going out to the park."

Despite the bad knee, injured for the first time in 1948, the fleet-handed Shuba hit at a healthy 305 clip for Brooklyn last year. He batted in 40 runs, many of them in tight pitching duels that decided the contest.

The sale of Andy Pafko to Boston Braves last month, plus the Dodgers' need for another left-handed hitter in the starting line-up, appear to make Shuba the logical candidate for the regular left-field berth.

"This is the first real opportunity I've had to win a regular job with Brooklyn since I joined the organization back in 1944," Shuba said. "I think I'd be a cinch if I were certain of the knee."
