1½ qts. canned tomatoes, or 8 lbs. ripe tomatoes
1½ cups chopped onions
1½ cups chopped celery
1¼ cups chopped green peppers
4½ teaspoons salt
3 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon Colman's Mustard
1 tablespoon Worcestershire Sauce
½ cup cider vinegar

If ripe tomatoes are used, peel and then chop. Combine with remaining ingredients, in order named, in a large kettle. Simmer, uncovered, 45 minutes, or until quite thick. Pour into clean, hot jars and cover. Set on wire rack in a covered kettle, with boiling water to cover tops of jars 1". Boil 30 minutes, from time boiling resumes. Makes 5 to 4 pts.
