 Wins By Forcing Opponent To Lead

Miss Brash's very light opening bid did more harm than good. It placed the king of diamonds in her hand and steered Mr. Masters away from a losing diamond finesse.

The king of clubs was the opening lead and at trick two Miss Brash shifted to her singleton spade. Dummy's ace of spades won and Mr. Masters saw that if spades broke 3-2, he could park his queen of diamonds on dummy's jack of clubs and lose only one spade and two clubs.

He cashed two rounds of trumps, then played dummy's king of spades and learned the bad news. Now he had two spade losers. However, the situation was far from hopeless.

IMPORTANT QUEEN
 The queen of diamonds now assumed a particularly important role in the play of the hand. It prevented Miss Brash from leading a diamond and it served as an almost certain throw-in card to put Miss Brash in the lead at the proper moment.

At the sixth trick Mr. Masters led a club to his queen. Miss Brash won with the ace and returned a club. Dummy's jack won and Mr. Masters discarded one of his two remaining spades.

QUEEN FOLLOWS ACE
 He now cashed the ace of diamonds and followed with the queen. Miss Brash was in again and this time any return she made would give Mr. Masters his contract.

She led a diamond and dummy ruffed while Mr. Masters discarded his last spade and claimed the rest of the tricks.
