## District News Women in India Have Last Word in Home

At a meeting of the Terrace Cancer Unit, presided over by Mrs. E. S. Laird, and held in the home of Mrs. L. Newhouse, plans were laid for the local "1953 Conquer Cancer Campaign" to be held this month. The quota was set at \$300.

It was arranged to hold a public meeting in the IOOP hall April 21 at which a report of the Vancouver conference will be given by the delegate, Mrs. Newhouse. A cancer film will also be shown. The campaign will end with a tag day May 2.

TORONTO (CP) — Women in India have the last word in the home, Dr. Lakshmi Rao told members of the Toronto Women's Association.

"Here in the west many persons have the idea that Indian women are kept in the background as obedient little housekeepers. But actually the Indian woman is queen of her household and has the final say in everything concerning it," she said.

As to professional life, Dr. Rao, who is the first woman of her race to receive a PhD in Canada, said that it has been the men who have encouraged Indian women to enter the professions.

She cited the case of her sister, a medical doctor, who when she attempted to pay fees at medical school was told it was not necessary as women were being encouraged to become doctors.

"However," added Dr. Rao, "they had to stop this as they were swamped with prospective doctors."

She said Indian women had been prominent in many professions long before western women, but were not particularly encouraged to go into business and financial careers.

"The men like to feel they have control of the money," said Dr. Rao.

Dr. Rao has spent the last three years in Canada and now is doing postgraduate work in bacteriology. She is also a don at Whitney Hall, University of Toronto.

The maple leaf has been regarded as Canada's national emblem since at least 1847.
