WASHINGTON - President Eisenhower challenged Russia's new leaders today to practice the peace they preach by agreeing to end the cold war, disarm the world and invest their savings in a global fund to start a war on "brute forces of poverty and

"The alternative," he said, "is at the worst, atomic war, and at lest unending fear, which finds humanity hanging from a cross

The President, said if Russia s willing to take preliminary steps including independence for East European satellites the U.S. would agree to work toward world disarmament plan which would ban atomic weap-


