IT PAYS TO ADVERTISE

New Zealand Committee To Report Soon

WELLINGTON, N.Z. (CP) - A committee appointed to determine the make-up of New Zealand's team for the Empire Games at Vancouver in 1954 is due to make its report shortly.

The committee has been examining probable costs and the contributions likely to be required from the New Zealand Empire Games Association and individual national sports associations.

"Canada sent a large team to the Empire Games in Auckland," said a spokesman of the association. "Our hope is to reciprocate. Travel and other costs, however, are likely to be high.

"The association spent about \$30,000 in sending the New Zealand team to the Olympic Games, and its resources are not so great that it can afford to fire money away. On the other hand it would be unfair to expect national associations to raise large sums of money in a hurry. The association intends to give all parties ample time to find the necessary money."

Owing to the suspension of the liner Aorangi's passenger service from Auckland to Vancouver, the team will have to travel by air, and the cost is likely to have an effect on the numbers New Zealand can send. It is likely that a fairly high standard will be set for selection.

FINE SURPLUS

However, the association profited richly from the Empire Games held in Auckland, when a surplus of more than \$70,000 accrued. This was handed to the Empire Games Association to use in overseas trips by sports teams. As the money was raised at the Empire Games, the association feels morally bound to give strong support to the Vancouver event.

Mr. Muzzy Goes Too Fast And Dumps One to a Queen



Mr. Muzzy's jump to four hearts wasn't too bad although if he found his partner with a minimum no trump opening, the odds would have been against his taking 10 tricks.

As it was, however, Mr. Champlion's one no trump bid was of the maximum variety and Mr. Muzzy should have made his game. The luck of the hand was evenly divided. There were two key cards held by the opponents - the ace of diamonds and the queen of spades. The former was right and the latter was wrong. But Mr. Muzzy could and should have played in such a manner as to avoid the necessity of the spade finesse.

Mr. Dale opened the jack of clubs and dummy's ace won. Out came the king of hearts and Mr. Meek won with the ace and returned his lone diamond.

Mr. Dale took the ace of diamonds and led back the queen. Dummy's king was put up and Mr. Meek ruffed and got out with a heart. After winning this trick and taking another round of trumps, Mr. Muzzy finessed the jack of spades, losing to the queen for down one.

"Same old story," said Mr. Champlion disgustedly. "You're always in such a hurry - you've always got to win the trick at hand. Why cover Dale's queen of diamonds with the king? Just duck it."

"Suppose he does," said Mr. Champlion. "You duck again and ruff in your hand. Then you pick up the trumps, go to dummy with the ace of spades or the king of clubs and discard a small spade on the king of diamonds. All you lose is one heart and two diamonds."

Mr. Champlion was right as usual. Even if Mr. Meek had started with two diamonds there was no need to win the king of diamonds on the second lead of that suit. The safe and sensible thing to do was to win it later - after trumps had been extracted.

SCREEN ★ FLASHES

"Angel Face," a tensely-told mystery melodrama, produced and directed by RKO Radio by Otto Preminger, opens Monday at the Totem Theatre.

This film, presented by Howard Hughes, offers a full measure of thrills and suspense, and stars Robert Mitchum and Jean Simmons.

The plot deals with the events that lead up to the murder of a wealthy man and his second wife; the trial of their daughter and her boy-friend, who are suspected of having committed the murder; it ends in a shocking climax that leaves one shivering.

Portraying the suspected killers are Robert Mitchum and Jean Simmons. Both give superb portrayals. Herbert Marshall and Barbara O'Neil score as the father and stepmother, the murder victims. Mona Freeman starring with Marshall, delivers an excellent performance as the girl Mitchum jilts for Miss Simmons.

Other players who turn in noteworthy portrayals include Leon Ames, as the defense attorney, top featured with Miss O'Neil. Kenneth Tobey, as the boy Mona turns to; Jim Backus, as the prosecuting attorney, and Raymond Greenleaf, as Miss Simmons' family lawyer.

For fans who like their entertainment on the tense side, this film is highly recommended.

In the opening of "Angel Face" movie fans see Robert Mitchum give Jean Simmons a powerful slap in the face to bring her out of hysterics. Actually, what shows on the screen is mild compared to what happened on the set where the two stars were at work.

This particular scene was photographed the first day the Howard Hughes presentation was in production, before the stars and players had settled down to the mood of RKO Radio's somber mystery melodrama. Producer-Director Otto Preminger started shooting the scene early in the morning. Before he secured the take seen in the completed film, Mitchum had delivered a total of 18 hard slaps to Miss Simmons' lovely cheek.

If anybody thinks the punches were faked, Miss Simmons can testify otherwise! She ended up with a swollen jaw that required an ice-pack on it overnight to have her face in shape for the close-ups the following day.
