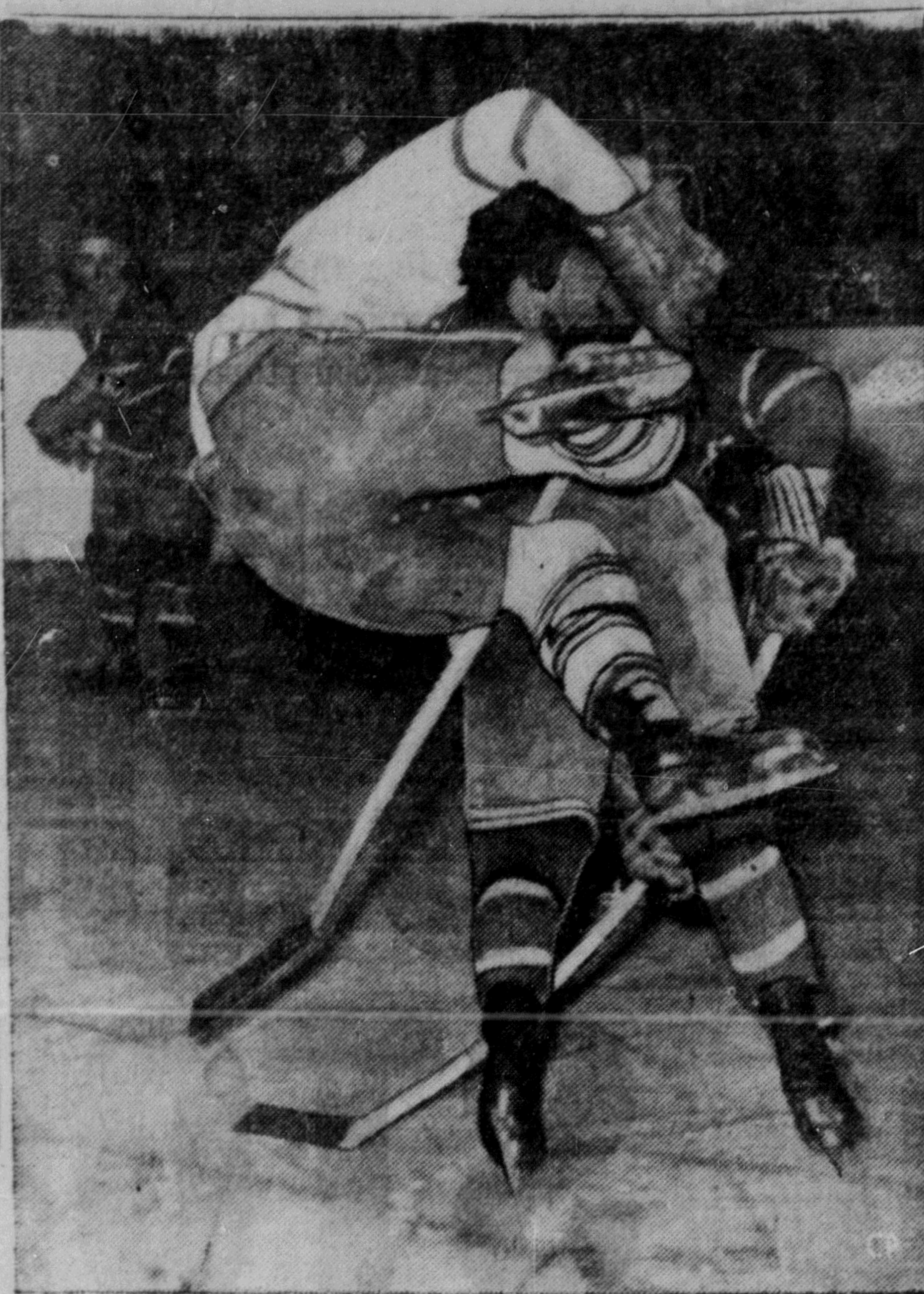

The audience cheered its approval as the victorious boxers lined up on the stage. They were Andy Marshall, Bill Morrison, Chuck Place, Bill Stacey and Don Carlson took the place of his brother Gden (Tiny). The heavyweight champion remained in Vancouver to join the Co-op Challengers basketball team.

With their coach, RCMP Constable Joe Ward, the list of champions was complete.

Mayor Harold Whalen opened the program with words of congratulations for the "outstanding accomplishments of these young men," but said he was sorry he was not acting officially

for the rest of the city council. "But I am sure I am speaking for the majority of Prince Rupert citizens when I say, 'well done boys, we are proud of you'."

Mrs. Elvina (Ma) Dickens, whom master of ceremonies Art Murray introduced as having contributed more than any other individual to the sports gate in Prince Rupert, made the presentations and greeted each athlete warmly with a handshake.

Gifts were from Prince Rupert Elks Club, sponsors of the presentation; from Abel & Odowes, and from Martin Saunders and his boys' boxing club. Theatre Manager Harry Black presented each member of the boxing club with a month's theatre pass for two.

Joe Ward came in for a lot of praise, too, by the mayor, Mrs. Dickens, Mr. Murray and Al Manson, Elks Boxing Club manager. The "best club award" trophy—a golden ring with two golden boxers—was publicly presented to Ward by Mr. Manson, who had returned with the trophy from Vancouver.

The presentation took place between shows. Earlier in the evening a dinner was given in honor of the boxing team, by Chef Len Cochlin at the Prince Rupert Hotel dining room.
