Violinist Charms Audience

Delightful Recital by
Ninna Bentzen

A small audience in United Church last night vowed others would be sorry they had not come to hear Miss Ninna Bentzen play her violin. Adults and children both responded in rapt attention to the artistry of her performance as she displayed her mastery of brilliant gypsy airs, the Czardas and Swedish folk-songs.

First part of the program was given to Sonatas by Handel and Bach including the familiar "Air," also by Bach, in which Miss Bentzen developed great clarity and richness of tone.

The violinist was fortunate in having the assistance of Henry Glynn, local pianist, as accompanist who was in complete sympathy with her performance, never being obtrusive.

In the second half of her program, Miss Bentzen displayed her love for light, airy music and presented such compositions as Kreisler's "Londonderry Air," and "Liebesleid;" Drlia's "Sousvenir," and Sandy's "Song of Vermland." These are violin works that appealed widely, some because of their familiar melodies; others, because of their technical brilliance and rhythm.

Sarasta's "Gypsy Airs," for instance, is a violinist's showpiece and Miss Bentzen gave full emotional interpretation beginning with a passionate gypsy serenade, then ending in the wild abandon of a gypsy dance.

Miss Bentzen appears again tonight in the program presented by First United Church Men's Club.

Esteemed Pioneer Woman Passes

Mrs. J. Arthur Smith Passes
Away After Brief Illness

Esteemed pioneer local woman who came here in the earliest days to make this city her home for more than forty years and become endeared to many friends, Mrs. Elsie Mary Smith, widow of the late J. Arthur Smith, passed away Tuesday evening in the Prince Rupert General Hospital. The funeral will take place Saturday morning from the Church of the Annunciation. There will be prayers Friday night in the B.C. Undertakers Chapel.

Death came to Mrs. Smith after a two weeks' illness.

Born in Chicago seventy-three years ago, Mrs. Smith came to the city from Kenora, Ontario, in 1909 with her husband who was a railway contractor and later became a real estate dealer and a prominent property owner.

In this city were born her four sons, Floyd, Edward, Carl and Walter. Edward lost his life while on service overseas with the Royal Canadian Air Force during World War II. The other three sons still reside here.

Mrs. Smith was a devout member of the Roman Catholic Church. She was active in Red Cross work in two wars. Her home through the years was at 1137 Second Avenue.

lated many anecdotes. Problems of railway building were brought into her picture. To many there had been difficulties and disappointment.

Mrs. MacPherson mentioned such prominent individualistic groups of immigrants as the Germans, the French, the Mennonites, the Doukhobors and Ukrainians.

"All the Doukhobors have not been poor citizens," she said "but a large group calling themselves Sons of Freedom are trouble-makers. Their way of life is ecstatic rather than aggressive and they do not make for good settlers."

On the other hand, the Mennonites were a good type of settler, shrewd, thrifty, good farmers and assimilating well.

Mormons, too, were a splendid type of people.

As for Ukrainians—they, too, were an excellent type—hardy, self-reliant and good-looking. The Speaker of the Legislature of Manitoba was a Ukrainian.

NOT COMMUNISTS

These new Canadian (Ukrainians) have the respect of their fellow citizens. Some would like to say they are Communistic but flowers were sent to her after such a group is very small. On

the whole they are opposed and repudiate decisively any leanings toward Communism. Their loyalty to Canada is absolute and unquestioned."

Although herself from Saskatchewan, Mrs. MacPherson described Alberta as "the most romantic, beautiful and versatile" of the prairie provinces. Edmonton she called "The Montreal of the West."

"I wouldn't want to live anywhere else than on the prairies or to have raised my family anywhere else," Mrs. MacPherson concluded. "It is a privilege to live in this granary of Empire whose unlimited resources astonish the world. We have freer ways. There is breathing space. There is intense love of country, not just of Saskatchewan or Alberta, but of all Canada."

Mrs. MacPherson, in passing alluded to the "inspired" selection by the Fathers of Confederation of the word "Dominion" as Canada's designation. "I, for one, hope the word is never deleted."

Appreciation of the club for Mrs. MacPherson's address was voiced by the president, Mrs. F. E. Anfield. Reference was made to the illness in hospital of the honorary president, Mrs. R. L. McIntosh, and the head table flowers were sent to her after the meeting.
