Queen Launches Royal Yacht

GLASGOW (Reuters) — The Queen launched her gleaming 416-foot yacht Britannia and told a cheering crowd of 20,000 it would often serve as a home for her much-travelled family.

Built at a cost of nearly \$5,000,000 at the Clydeside yards here, the 4,000-ton Britannia is the first new yacht for the royal family in 54 years. Its construction was originally envisaged by the late King George VI.

The name Britannia for the sleek blue and white vessel was a secret until Elizabeth, working a pushbutton, broke a bottle of wine over its bow. When the band's strains of "Rule Britannia" died away, Elizabeth made a short speech.

"The Britannia is not only the most modern addition to a long line of royal yachts which goes back to the reign of King Charles II, but it is to be, at times, the home of my husband and myself and of our family."

Danish Ship Rolls Over After Fire

HARWICK, England (AP) — The Danish luxury passenger ship Kronprins Frederik was swept by fire in port here Sunday night. She rolled over on her side Monday and at high tide only three feet of the 3,895-ton vessel were above water.

Most of the crew had gone ashore and there were no passengers aboard. The fire is believed to have been caused by an electrical fault.

Dulles Questions Sincerity of Soviet Shift From 'Offensive to Defensive Mood'

WASHINGTON (AP) — State Secretary Dulles declared that Communist agreement to an armistice in Korea.

Eisenhower administration had forced Russia to go on a "peace meet."

He challenged the Kremlin to

President Eisenhower's

"true peace offensive" with peaceful action and to abandon its conspiracy to overthrow "every genuinely free government in the world."

"Any military aggressor that attacked our free world partnership would be doomed to sure defeat," he said in a speech to the American Society of Newspaper Editors.

Pending evidence of a basic change in Soviet foreign policy, he declared, the West will persist in building its strength in such a way as to maintain resistance against Red pressure indefinitely.

In this connection Dulles said that in a North Atlantic Treaty Council meeting at Paris last week the United States, using a "fresh approach," will seek to assure Europe of substantial defenses and to provide for "growing reliance on Western Europe's own strength" over the future.

One aim would be to preserve the free world's economic stability and thus disappoint Soviet hopes that non-Communist nations will plunge into bankruptcy and thus open themselves to a death blow.

Asserting that the Eisenhower policies toward Europe were not determined by any recent Soviet moves, Dulles added:

"We are not dancing to any Russian tune."

Soviet manoeuvres of recent weeks had been commonly called a "peace offensive" but this was incorrect. It was "a peace defensive."

"It is gratifying that Soviet leaders appear now to have shifted from an offensive to a defensive mood." But we cannot yet tell whether this represents a basic change, or merely a tactical shift.

Efforts to diversify trade paying off for Canada

OTTAWA (CP) — Trade Minister Howe, who has guided Canada's trade economy since 1948, says that at no time in the past has Canada been more prosperous and he thinks there are even better times ahead.

The 67-year-old American-born minister made his annual report on domestic and foreign economic conditions to the Commons. He said Canada has

attracted the attention of the world by her rapid expansion and her stability, and he predicted a continuation of the trend.

The expansion, he said, is no flash in the pan based on tem-

porary boom conditions. Investment plans for capital expenditure are expected to touch \$5,400,000,000 this year—compared with \$5,100,000,000 in 1952—and this "reflects the growing diversity and adaptability of Canada's industry and the capacity to produce economically an increasing proportion of the world's requirements."

Giving an extensive report as his estimates came before members for scrutiny, the minister said that in spite of predictions of recessions and depressions, Canadian production and expansion rarely faltered since the end of the war.

Canada's gross national production reached \$23,000,000,000 last year, compared with \$21,400,000,000 in 1951, a year of "notable progress in the standards of living for the Canadian people."

Continued development of resources and productive capacity would make possible an even higher standard.

Continuing world-wide demand for Canada's major export products and the relative stability of export prices "provide evidence of the basic strength of Canada's position in world trade," the minister said.

There was a continuing demand for Canadian wheat. In the present crop year Canada expected to export "all the wheat that can be handled by our transportation and storage facilities."

The United States remained Canada's best customer, but overseas trade with Britain and other countries was increasing. Efforts to diversify Canada's trade were paying off.

'Army' Cook Posed as Man For 25 Years

GRIMSBY, England (AP) — A 62-year-old Salvation Army cook who had posed as a man for 25 years was exposed in death as a woman.

The cook, who used the name John Wilson, fell ill Monday but refused to receive a doctor. She died 24 hours later.

Major F. J. Brown, in charge of the Salvation Army hostel here, told reporters:






In 1858, the steamboat "Surprise" became the first vessel to carry passengers up the Fraser River to Hope.
