

Noted U.S. Athletes Not Coddled in Army Officer Tells Investigating Committee

WASHINGTON (AP)—Congressional investigators called army officers to a public hearing this afternoon to explain reports that 10 prominent American athletes spent most of their time in the army playing baseball or boxing.

Eight major league baseball players and two boxers are listed among the 10 men whose cases are under study by a House of Representatives armed services sub-committee headed by Representative William E. Hess (Rep., Ohio).

The House members are trying to find out whether these men were "coddled" while in the army by being permitted to play baseball and box instead of carrying part in normal military duties.

Brig. Gen. Herbert P. Powell, deputy chief of the army's personnel division, told the sub-committee the army's sport program of baseball, basketball, football and other games are "not a luxury, even for the spectators."

But, he acknowledged "in a few cases, field commanders may not have carried out department policy."

To back up his contention that the army has not given preferential treatment to athletes, Powell handed the committee a list of 62 men he said were nationally known athletes and entertainers who served overseas between 1952 and 1954.

Among the better known athletes on the list were Curt Simmons, pitcher for Philadelphia Phillies; Don Larsen, pitcher for Baltimore Orioles; Del Crandall, catcher for Milwaukee Braves; Leo Kiely, pitcher for Boston Red Sox; Arnold Galiffa, army football quarterback and Clayton Tonnemaker, Minnesota football star.

Vatican's Guard Observes Rites

VATICAN CITY (AP)—With the squeal of life and beat of drum, the Vatican's colorful Swiss guard yesterday observed the 427th anniversary of their historic "death stand" in defence of Pope Clement VII.

The anniversary commemorates the stand of the Swiss guards May 6, 1527. During the sack of Rome they stood before the onslaught of German mercenaries, giving Pope Clement time to reach the safety of castle Sant'Angelo fortress on the bank of the Tiber. Of the 189 guards, 147 were killed.
