

Terrace Candidates Outline Platforms at Public Meeting

PRINCE — Six candidates for the three village council seats in next week's election were introduced to the public at a pre-election public meeting staged by the Junior Chamber of Commerce. It was the first such session in the history of the village.

The candidates are: Dudley Little, Geoff Little, Harry Philip, New Little, John deKergomard, and Bill Richards and Claude Little.

The meeting, conducted by President Lionel Houle, heard talks by Emil Haug, commission chairman, outlined the achievements of the commission in the past and tribute to the volunteer department.

Kirkaldy praised Mr. Little for his personal efforts.

forts in maintaining water supplies and outlined the cost to ratepayers of sidewalk construction, some \$450 per foot.

Discussing sewage and water problems, Mr. Little warned that the proposed Deep Creek water project would involve the question of chlorination and said that a complete water and sewage scheme in the village might amount to an assessment of 30 cents per foot frontage.

Mr. Lambley also spoke on the water problem, pointing out the cost of pumping and tank maintenance in the present system and saying considerable saving was anticipated through use of a reservoir and gravity feed system. He said pumping had cost \$4,000 in 11 months.

Mr. Philip, speaking on village finance, said there would be a healthy surplus at the end of the year. He praised Alec Gillanders, village clerk, for his excellent work in assisting with the budget, and congratulated the commission on the fact that only six per cent of collectable taxes were outstanding.

Remaining proceeds will go into the Kin general projects fund, for aid to their Lakelse Lake kiddies' camp, sports days and other projects for youngsters.
