YOUNG ASTRONOMER INVENTS OWN FIRMAMENT—Merritt Stevenson, 18, poses beside a planetarium which took him 1,000 hours over a one-year span to build. The 12-sided solid, underneath the dome, has pin holes varying in size from 1/100 to 1/400 of an inch through which light passes from the inside to project the stars on the dome hanging overhead. Stevenson spent, 300 hours plotting the position of the stars on the dodecahedron before drilling the holes. The dome, in which the more than 1,000 stars are reproduced, measures 8.4 feet in diameter. The project costing young Stevenson \$100, is located in the basement of Chicago's Adler Planetarium.
