SEEK YE FIRST THE KINGDOM OF GOD . . .

Eye specialists tell us that there are three main kinds of eye trouble: nearsightedness, astigmatism, and farsightedness. Our range of vision is determined by the point at which the lines from our eyes intersect. If the distance is a few inches or a few feet from the ends of our noses, then we are nearsighted and corrective visual aids are prescribed.

Unfortunately, a person can be spiritually nearsighted too. Such a person can see little farther than the tip of his own nose. His first concern is himself. He talks about "my feelings, my career, my freedom, my rights." Spiritual nearsightedness is a sickness, the sickness of self; and Jesus said: "They that are whole need

not a physician, but they that are sick."

Next, let us look at astigmatic vision. We are told that when the mirror of the eye (the retina) fails to receive the light rays in perfect focus, the result is blurred, spotty, fuzzy vision. It seems that we are living in an age when a premium is placed on blurry vision and our blind spots are being capitalized upon. Of course, we cannot seek or even see the Kingdom of God with this kind of eyeight. It is probable that no matter what our pet prejudice or bias may be, sooner or later we shall find an organization to condone it. The astigmatic visionary sees everything out of focus, out of relationship, and doesn't realize it.

Then there are the farsighted . . . those for whom only the distant objects stand out clearly: those who build air castles in the mists of "what might have been." They refuse to look at the facts at hand, and continue to build larger and larger barns in which to store the dreams of their own confusion while the foundations rot and decay around them.

The cause for our blindness lies in our wills: we don't see because we don't want to see. We refuse to look to God, and then wonder why life isn't going too smoothly. If we would recognize that our vision is faulty, that we are sinners in need of corrected eyesight that only God in Jesus Christ can remedy, then we have taken the first step on the road leading to God. May we have the courage to admit our need of corrected eyesight and turn to Him who said: "Seek ye first the Kingdom of God and all . . . things shall be added unto you."


