Costing more than \$15,000 and weighing almost three tons, the big machine incorporates the latest devices in typesetting for speed, accuracy, variety of type and

easy operation. With a twin keyboard which looks almost like that of a pipe organ, the Blue Streak makes it possible for the operator to switch readily from one type-face to another. Headlines and the various type-faces required for advertising and commercial printing can be produced as easily as the smaller print used in news stories. A feature of the machine is that all moving parts are enclosed so that the operator's attention is not distracted from the keyboard. Surface, that would reflect glare are also toned down to simplify operation. A heating pot of the latest design is included to keep the metal used in printing at the precise temperature required for melting. Magazines for new type-faces will be added to the machine as the occasion demands.

With addition of the Blue Streak the Daily News now has five type-setting machines in operation.
