Miner Kicks Goal In Last Quarter

WINNIPEG (CP)—Winnipeg Blue Bombers are in second place in the Western Interprovincial Football Union today, thanks to the educated toe of end Tom Miner.

Two Lions Injured In Traffic

WINNIPEG (CP)—Two players with the British Columbia Lions were slightly injured early today in a two-car collision. Another player was shaken up.

Quarterback Paul Cameron suffered a bruised chest and centre Steve Palmer received a strained back. Reserve quarterback Jerry Gustafson was shaken up.

The three football players were taken to their hotel. They will undergo a thorough medical checkup later in the morning. They were riding in a taxi which was struck in the rear by another vehicle near a downtown intersection. The taxi was pushed into a tree. No other injuries were reported.

Information on the injuries and accident came from the team doctor and other sources.

Dr. Hector Gillespie said he did not think the injuries were serious enough to keep Cameron and Palmer out of Monday's game in Regina against Saskatchewan Roughriders.

The accident occurred several hours after the Lions dropped a 3-1 decision to Winnipeg Blue Bombers in a regular scheduled Western Interprovincial Football Union game.

Cameron and Palmer played for UCLA last year. Gustafson joined the Lions last week from San Francisco of the National Football League. He travelled with the team to get an idea of Canadian football plays. He did not see action Friday night.

Rainiers Rally To Nip Mounties 4-3

A pinch-hit double by Jim Dyck in the ninth inning gave Seattle Rainiers a 4-3 victory over Vancouver Mounties in a Pacific Coast League baseball game in Vancouver Friday night.

The two teams conclude their series with a game in Vancouver today.

Mounties led 3-0 after three innings but Seattle tied it up in the eighth with a two-run homer by Bill Gray after scoring a single run in the seventh.

Dyck's double brought home Bobby Balena in the ninth after Balena singled and was sacrificed to second.

Sacramento whipped the slipping Hollywood Stars 4-2 in a 14th game ahead of fourth-place Portland. The Beavers, at the same time, were registering their third straight victory over Los Angeles 7-3. A grand slam home run by Frank Carswell gave Beavers the win.

In the other PCL game, a three-run homer by Larry Dillip sparked San Francisco Seals to a 12-0 victory over San Diego. Seals now are 1½ games ahead of seventh place Padres.

Today's schedule: Sacramento at Hollywood, San Diego at San Francisco, Los Angeles at Portland, Seattle at Vancouver.

For the second time in less than a week, Miner has used a last-quarter field goal to bring his team from behind and chalk up a victory.

Friday night the field goal accounted for all Bombers' points as Al Sherman's team edged British Columbia Lions 3-1 to go into a tie with the second-place Lions.

Miner, obtained in an off-season trade with Calgary Stampeders for tackle Dick Huffman, was not nearly as dramatic as against Stamps Monday night.

Then, he kicked a field goal from 37 yards out on the last play of the game for a 16-15 Winnipeg win. Calgary has protested the win, claiming Bombers had 11 men on the field at the time.

WIFU action resumes tonight at Calgary with Stamps having the opportunity to tie Saskatchewan Roughriders' record of one victory.

A Calgary win would deadlock Stamps with Riders in fourth place of the five-team loop. A Saskatchewan victory would boost Riders into a second-place tie with Winnipeg and British Columbia.

The league-leading Edmonton Eskimos are idle until Monday night when they play Winnipeg in Edmonton's Clarke Stadium.

COME FROM BEHIND
A crowd of 15,727 saw Bombers come from behind for the 3-1 win over British Columbia in rain and cool temperatures.

Bombers had the edge in yards rushing 160 to 112 but Lions had a 115 to 31 bulge in yards gained passing.

The coast team completed six of 19 forward attempts compared with Winnipeg's five of 15 but Bombers intercepted four Lion forwards, all in the second half, compared with none by the British Columbia team.


Lions fumbled the slippery ball four times against two by Bombers. The coast team lost three of their own four but recovered both Winnipeg fumbles. The game-winning field goal was set up by a penalty against Lions for roughing quarterback Herman Eagle Day. Bombers won possession on the Lions' 20 and when their attack bogged down on the British Columbia seven, Miner came in to kick the field goal.

The game's only touchdown was nullified by an offside ruling. Buddy Leake of Bombers fumbled and fullback Al Pollard of Lions recovered on his own 14 and ran 90 yards to the Winnipeg goal-line. But the officials called the ball back, ruling Lions had been offside.

Romero Seeks Parker Crown

Mathews Big Gun In Braves' Victories

Ed Mathews, Milwaukee's slumbering thumper, finally is laying the wood to the ball, and the Braves have picked up the beat to gain a fast start in what may prove a suicide weekend for National League pennant contenders.

Mathews, a 24-year-old left-hander slugger who had only 20 home runs at the start of August, socked his 34th home run and drove in five runs Friday night as the Braves swept a two-night doubleheader from St. Louis, 6-5 and 5-3.

The Braves, carried to 11 innings before putting the opener away, gained a 2½-game lead with the sweep while second-place Brooklyn was defeating New York Giants 7-3. Cincinnati's persistent Redlegs came from behind with two ninth-inning runs to defeat Chicago Cubs 4-3 and still slipped 2½ games off the lead.

Pittsburgh defeated Philadelphia 6-3.

LEMON POUNDS THREE
In the American League, Washington's Jim Lemon out-homered Mickey Mantle 3-to-1, but the Mick's shot was his 47th and broke up a tie game as New York Yankees defeated the Senators 6-4. Second-place Cleveland slipped 8½ games behind the ranks, as Chicago White Sox, held to one hit for nine innings by Early Wynn, defeated the Indians 1-0 in a 10-inning nightcap after losing the two-night opener 3-2.

Al Kaline's five RBIs and the three-single pitching of Paul Foytack gave Detroit a 6-1 decision over Kansas City. Four Baltimore home runs smashed Boston 11-0.

Mantle Hits 47th Homer For President

WASHINGTON (AP)—President Eisenhower cheered Mickey Mantle's 47th home run of the season Friday night. But it was lanky Jim Lemon of the losing Washington Senators, with three homers in a row, who really set the president to yelling like a schoolboy.

Eisenhower went out to Griffith Stadium to the New York-Washington game with the express purpose of seeing Mantle, the Yankee's great slugger, edge closer to the 1927 record of 60 home runs set by Babe Ruth.

"Hit two home runs for me tonight," photographers standing by the president's box quoted him as telling Mickey when the Yankee centerfielder stopped by just before the game.

Mantle promised to try, and he did come through with one in the seventh inning. It was a mighty clout which hit the electric light tower just beyond the right field wall.

The Yankees did win the game, 6-4, and Eisenhower, as a Washington resident, possibly got no satisfaction out of that.

But he certainly got plenty of satisfaction out of seeing young Jim Lemon perform for the Senators. On his first three trips to the late Lemon lashed home runs into the left field bleachers.

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Johnny Longden Set For Double Celebration

DEL MAR, Calif. (AP)—This is the day, says Johnny Longden's agent, "that I've been pointing for."

It is Longden's 15th wedding anniversary and he could celebrate it by equaling or breaking the world's riding record of Sir Gordon Richards of England.

Longden's 29-year-old win total is only four short of Sir Gordon's 4,870 record and he has seven mounts in today's racing program.

His agent, 70-year-old Basil Smith, who from long association is inclined to speak of himself and the jockey as a single person, says:

"I want to break the record on the anniversary. It would be nice. Something to remember."

Longden, 46-year-old native of Taber, Alta., was letting Smith do the talking.

If he doesn't equal or break the record today, he likely will get around to it Monday or some day next week, barring accidents.
