

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

Mr. Pawson: (after a langthy explanation) ended his remarks with: "It means this, that the increase on domestic water heating is about 100% but the increase on domestic usage, excluding water heating, is 8.6%, so the average of those two percentages

The Commission: "I make it around 45%."

Mr. Pawson: You are right, Sir."
