### Seven Bail Out From Big Plane

ANCHORAGE, Alaska (AP)—United States Air Force and Civil Air Patrol planes continued an intensified search of the frigid waters of Cook Inlet Tuesday for seven æirmen who parachuted from a crippled KC97 Strato-tanker.

Eight airmen balled out of the acrial-fueling plane Monday. One was found on bleak Fire Island, 14 miles from here. He suffered only minor injuries.




