In fact, it would have been remarkable, if not an unsatiafactory exercise, had not some lessons been learned from it. In this regard, one of the most fruitful sessions of the whole exercise was a meeting the same evening at which each of the chiefs of (1) services and special observers referred to the highlights, good or bad, of the operations. At this meeting no punches were pulled and much useful information was abtained.

"This was indeed a well conceived, planned, and executed, practical civil defeace exercise which brought the people of these two rather isolated cities closer together, in spite of international boundaries.

"Finally, it must give the people of Prince Rupert a nice feeling to know that provided they have the hard core of an organized, practical and active disaster group and a willing, co-operative and basics ally trained general public, they can lock after themselves and their good neighbors in an emergency, at deast until succor can arrive from outside.
