

NEW YORK (#)-Willie Howard Mays, spectacular centrefielder contresielder of the New York Giants, was voted today the most valuable player in the National League for | 1997 | 1997 1954 by the Baseball Writers' Association of America.

The young outfielder, whose exploits at bat and in the field were prime factors in the Giants' pennant and world series success. was the overwhelming choice of the 24-man committee, receiving 283 points as compareti to 217 for runner-up Ted Kluszewski of Cincinnati.

The 23-year-old wonder boy was named on every ballot. He received 16 first-place votes, two second-place votes, six for sec-'ond, two for third, live for fourth' defeat in three games since mak-, and one each for fifth, sixth and eighth.

Playing his first full season in the majors, Mays captured the National League batting championship with a rousing 345, led the circuit with 13 triples and also won the slugging title with an impressive .667 percentage. 
