The three-day festival, which starts Wednesday morning, will be climaxed Friday night by the attendance of Premier W. A. C. Bennett, who is making an official one-day visit to Prince Rupert. Mr. Bennett will appear at the festival at 9 p.m. at the invitation of the association.

Burton L. Kurth of Vancouver, who has been connected with the festival movement for more than 30 years will adjudicate 180 entrants.

Mr. Kurth also adjudicated the 1951 and 1954 Prince Rupert District Music Festivals.

Highlighting the festival will be the 45-piece Ketehikan High school band competing against the Booth Memorial High school band; 30 voices entered from the Hazelton Amalgamated Elementary Senior High school and Mike Colussi's accordion band.

Honorary-president C. G. Ham will officially open the festival Wednesday night at 7:30 p.m.

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
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
