THREE CONTINENTS Canadian troops formed a defence in the intricate pattern of the defences of the United Nations and NATO. At home, with three new Regiments in the Army, training went on to provide replacements for the overseas and maintain the defences of the country. The layout shows some facets of the Army's activities during the year. Ottawa Feels Government helping Jobless Enough

OTTAWA (CP) — Unemployment winter will be worse than last winter will be worse than last winter's post-war high. The peak was last March when the labour department reported 569,000 unemployed job applicants. Prime Minister St. Laurent, meanwhile, was replying Wednesday to a request from British Columbia's Premier W. A. C. Bennett that the federal government bear 40 per cent of the cost of relief payments to "unemployed employables" in B.C. Mr. Bennett's Dec. 10 telegram to the prime minister suggested that 40 per cent of the cost borne by the provincial government and 20 per cent by municipalities.
