

Hardware Takes Game Lead With 10-3 Decision Off Hotel

Gordon and Anderson took a game edge in the Prince Rupert Senior baseball playoff last night at Roosevelt Park, pounding out a 10-3 victory off Commercial Hotel's Dick Letourneau in the second game of the best of five finals.

The hotelmen lost a brief 3-1 lead in the bottom of the second when Letourneau gave up six hits, including doubles to Stan Petrow and winning pitcher Lawrence (Poppy) Kristmanson, which along with an error brought in six G & A runs.

The slow-baller was replaced on the mound in the bottom of the third, with one out and the bases loaded, by Jack Lindsay who successfully snuffed the threat.

Letourneau returned to the mound for the fourth and gave up a triple to Bill Sundberg who scored on Ralph Enridge's second hit of the game to give the G & A centrefielder his third RBI of the game. Enridge drove in G & A's last run in the bottom of the sixth on a ground out.

G & A scored in the first on Don Hartwig's double and groundouts by Sundberg and Don Scherk. Commercial brought their three runs in in the second. Lindsay led off, reaching first on an error, was moved round when Cliff Dahl walked and was brought home on Gord Cameron's single. Manager Minnie Simundson drove in Dahl and Don Hawryluk who singled.

A possible hotel rally was nipped in the seventh, when with one away Gord Cameron was thrown out at home on a short passed ball and Ron Cameron

hit a line drive into Kristmanson's glove.

Winner Kristmanson gave up five hits, two walks and struck out two.

Letourneau allowed 10 hits, three walks and struck out four.

Lindsay, who faced only two men, allowed a fielder's choice and a fly-out.

Swaps-Nashua Showdown Set Today

CHICAGO (AP)—Nashua from the East and Swaps from the west possibly the most brilliant three-year-olds ever to be matched—take off today in what should rank as one of the greatest showdowns in the history of thoroughbred racing.

They will settle sophomore honors and undoubtedly horse-of-the-year recognition in a \$100,000 winner-take-all race at 1 1/4 miles on Washington Park's "neutral" dirt oval.

Each will pack 126 pounds—the same impost, the same distance, and the same jockeys as in their only other 1955 meeting the Kentucky Derby. In that race, Nashua, with Eddie Arcaro up, challenged in mid-stretch only to have Willie Shoemaker and Swaps sweep on to a 1 1/2-length win in 2:01 4-5.

IMPRESSIVE RECORDS

Since then William Woodward Jr.'s Nashua has won the Pre-Kness, Belmont, Dwyer and Arlington classic for a sophomore record of eight wins in nine starts and winnings of \$529,700. Just \$119,707 short of Citation's record as a three-year-old.

The California-bred Swaps, owned by Rex C. Ellsworth, added after-Derby wins in the Will Rogers, California, the Westerner and the American Derby, compiling a record of eight straight victories as a three-year-old and earnings of \$418,500.

The match-race contenders have worked in spectacular fashion for the showdown and are considered in peak condition. This, plus a forecast of fair and pleasant weather, plus a possible fast track, added up to a "natural."

The race will start at 3 p.m. P.D.T. There will be parimutuel win betting only.

Odds list Swaps at 3 to 5 and Nashua 6 to 5.

Athletics Spill Yanks Into Second-Place Tie

No matter who wins the pennant, the American League idol will have clay feet and a glass chin.

The four contenders, one of whom has to serve as champ, have been tagged with a sucker punch in 10 of their last 18 games with the second division, and a pretty scrawny second division at that.

Tuesday night, Kansas City Athletics, 24 games deep in sixth

place, dropped New York 1-3, spilling the Yankees from first place into a second place tie with Cleveland Indians. With that assist Chicago White Sox moved a half-game ahead with a 7-5 decision over Boston Red Sox.

The White Sox didn't ride into the lead on a white charger. They backed in with five unearned runs.

Cleveland, meanwhile, stopped the nonsense and moved up with a 7-4 triumph over Baltimore Orioles—but had the help of eight walks that became four runs.

BROOKS HOT AGAIN

In the National, Brooklyn went 13 games in front by beating Milwaukee Braves 8-6 as Don Newcombe finally won his 19th for Dodgers; New York Giants ended a five-game slump with a 5-0, 9-7 sweep of Cincinnati Redlegs; Chicago Cubs clipped Philadelphia Phillies 3-1, and Pittsburgh Pirates beat St. Louis 3-1 after the Cards had wrapped up a 1-0 verdict in the completion of a suspended game.

Middleweight Soldier Joey Ranked Eighth

NEW YORK (AP)—Soldier Joey Glambra's fine showing in his non-title fight with middleweight champion Carl (Bobo) Olson has moved the former contender from Buffalo, N.Y., back into the middleweight picture.

The 21-year-old fighter was ranked as the fourth contender until he went into the army, but was dropped from the ratings while he was inactive. Now he has been restored to a No. 8 berth for his strong but losing effort against Olson last Friday night.

Rankings were released today by Ring magazine, the boxing monthly.

Nino Valdes' loss to light heavyweight Bob Satterfield dropped the big Cuban from fifth to seventh among the heavyweights. Ezzard Charles, the former heavyweight king, advanced from sixth to fifth, behind Don Cockell of England.

Earl Walls of Edmonton, only Canadian listed in the ratings, remains in sixth place.

Carpenter Tops In Point Race

WINNIPEG (AP)—Ken Carpenter, Saskatchewan Roughriders' hard-hitting halfback from Cleveland Browns, has rolled for five touchdowns in three Western Interprovincial Football Union games to take the individual scoring lead with 25 points.

Statistics compiled by The Canadian Press for games up to and including Aug. 29 show Carpenter, a second-year import, is five points ahead of runner-up Normie Kwong, fullback with Edmonton Eskimos who has four touchdowns. Both Carpenter and Kwong scored three touchdowns each against British Columbia Lions.

Quarterback Buddy Leavé of Winnipeg Blue Bombers dropped from a first-place tie last week to third spot. The first-year import from the University of Oklahoma has 13 points on one touchdown, a field goal, four converts and a single.

In fourth place is Joe Aguirre of the Riders with 11 points. Aguirre, scoring champion last year with 88 points, has one field goal, seven converts and one single in two games.
