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
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City Women Take Part In World Day of Prayer

According to an Associated Press survey the praying began at daybreak in the Fiji and Tonga Islands, just beyond the International dateline.

In the United States, special proclamations were issued by many mayors and governors, calling attention to the observance. It is sponsored nationally by the 10,000,000-member United Church Women.

Started in 1887 by a small group in New York, the movement has spread gradually until now interdenominational bodies in many lands observe the occasion on the same date — the first Friday of Lent.

This year church groups in several additional areas—Israel, Czechoslovakia, Bali, Gibraltar, New Britain, Okinawa, Timor, Papua, Gambi and Togoland — took up the custom.

In hundreds of churches, special services are scheduled. Many other institutions have set aside intervals during the day for prayer.

History of Rotary Outlined As 50th Anniversary Marked

Rotary International's 50th anniversary was celebrated here last night at a dinner and dance in the Aero Club attended by 120 Rotarians and guests.

As chairman of the anniversary committee, A. P. Crawley traced the history of Rotary from the time the idea was conceived by Paul Harris, a young law graduate of Chicago. With three friends, Mr. Harris founded the organization which now has 400,000 members in 89 countries and geographical regions around the world. In B.C. alone there are 45 clubs with a total of 3,700 members.

Emphasizing that the purpose of Rotary is to render service, Mr. Crawley said that this year the project of the local club is establishment of a children's ward in the hospital. He pointed out that Rotary has given much assistance to hospitals and that in India it went so far as to build one. He believed that in India particularly the growth of Rotary will be rapid and predicted that in the next 50 years total membership would reach one million.

The speaker made special mention of Col. S. D. Johnston who was a member of the local club when it was founded 24 years ago.

Rotarians, wives and guests were welcomed by T. B. Black, president of the Prince Rupert club. Mr. Black spoke of the
