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

ALL the members of the British Commonwealth, including Canada, have taken the position that as Formosa is a recognized part of China, no outside country has any more reason or right to try to stop the Chinese Reds from attacking Chiang Kai-Shek's forces on! that island than it would have if it tried to prevent Chiang Kai-Shek's forces from attacking the Chinese mainland.

That is of course the correct; legal position. It was most emphatically stated by Canada! when we entered the Korean war. Canada made it very clear that we would not get involved' in complications arising from the U.S. policy of protection of Chiang Kai-Shek.

However, the legal position is one thing and the world balance of power is another. It is quite true that Formosa is a key link in the chain of air and sea bases on which U.S. power! in the western Pacific depends. In my opinion, it is quite unrealistic for anybody to expect! Uncle Sam to allow that base to fall into hostile hands, ir this period of world tension.
